MUNICIPAL CREDIT

Plan Proposed for Appointment of Commission in Alberta

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 14.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of municipal affairs for Alberta, is working on a plan for the appointment of a provincial commission on municipal credit, which will be submitted to the legislature at the next session in Edmonton in the event that it is not taken up directly by the provincial council, as now planned.

The commission would assist rural municipalities, of which there are eighty-four in Alberta at present, in marketing their bonds, at the same time checking expenditures for improvements in communities where there is no pressing need for them, or arranging for carrying out the work on a more conservative scale. The department of municipal affairs at present lends its approval to flotation of bonds. The effect of the new plan is that the taxpayers know exactly to what they are committing themselves.

TO BE POST MORTEM

Body of Baby Boy is Found in Rockwood Park—Not Sure Yet Whether or Not it Was Born Alive

A post-mortem examination will be made upon the body of an infant boy found yesterday afternoon in Rockwood Park near the northeastern entrance from the public gardens. Coroner W. F. Roberts this morning made a superficial examination, but could not determine from that as to the actual cause of the little one's death or whether or not it had lived after birth. For this reason he decided that a post-mortem should be made.

When the baby was found yesterday afternoon by two boys near the road, they notified Policeman Pitt, who brought the body to the city and placed it in the morgue. There were no marks of identification upon the little one. Apparently it had not been there very long. It was almost in a state of nudity only a rough piece of sack-cloth being wrapped about the little body.

Another Provincial Boy Who Has Climbed Ladder of Success

Another provincial boy who has made a success in the states is in St. John today. He is J. W. McDermott, a native of Moncton, but some years ago on the staff of F. P. Curran as a boy in the news room at the Union Depot. He followed railroad work and, though but a young man yet, has steadily climbed to an important position among the conductors of the Pennsylvania railroad, running between New York and Washington. His home is in New York.

Mr. McDermott has just been on a mission to San Francisco for the Pennsylvania railway and he will be in charge of all the trains of his line running into Princeton for the Panama Exposition. He has just been to Moncton to see his father, James McDermott, and today called on Mr. Curran, happily reviving old memories. Mr. McDermott will have old Montreal tonight on the way back to New York.

GOVERNMENT INVESTIGATION OF THE FORESTERS' QUESTION

Toronto Men Taking Action—Statement of Reported Offer by Stevenson Objected To

(Toronto Globe)

The pro-99 members of the I. O. E. who are organizing a campaign to inquire into the actions of the supreme court in placing a lien against their pole, held another meeting at Broadway Hall, St. John, evening last night, and appointed a committee consisting of J. A. O'Brien, secretary, W. D. Watson, J. J. A. O'Brien, and T. D. Thomson. Besides taking part in the campaign to arouse feeling against what they allege is an injustice to them, the committee will secure expert legal advice and prepare the way to obtaining a government investigation into the situation.

Something of a sensation was precipitated when Chairman O'Brien declared that Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson offered to purchase the poles owned by the committee which interviewed him for \$100 each, or an equivalent of ten per cent of the pole. "I object to that," declared Supreme Auditor Stewart. "I cannot credit Mr. Stevenson with making such an offer."

W. D. Watson, secretary of the executive read the list of questions placed before the chief ranger at a recent conference, together with the answers.

"We are told," said Mr. Watson, "that the revenue of the Temple Building is only two per cent of the actual cost of one of our assets built with pro-99 members' money."

POLICE COURT

A fine of \$20 was allowed to stand against Andrew Delaney, a bill-poster, in the police court this morning on a charge of assaulting William Magee by striking him with a brush-stick. Delaney said that it was not intentional, that he had not seen the complainant until after he had struck his knee with the stick while pasting bills on a fence on the route to East St. John. Magee said the defendant had been rather falling in his remarks afterwards, and that he had had to limp for a time after being hit. His Honor told Delaney to be more careful, and to remember always that the sidewalk must always be primarily for the use of pedestrians.

Another man named Delaney, not a bill poster but a "popt" summoned William, the author of the pastoral effusion, "The Taters are Dig," was fined \$50 or six months in jail on a charge of begging and fighting.

William Harrison was committed for trial on a charge of theft of a coat and trousers.
