Re Mohawk Institute.

You have not recalled correctly the burden of our conversation on the subject of the Mohawk Institute. I was merely talking over the probable future of the school and had suggested that it might be advisable to turn it into a girls' school and to provide another institute for boys where they might be taught agriculture. The matter would have to be further debated and arranged before we could approach the New England Company officially. If the change were carried out the New England Company should be able to abandon either the whole or the greater part of the manual training farm, which might be sold.
