MINERS UNIONS SEEK REVENGE.

Rebellion is Threatened Out in Colorado. Maddened by Military Rule, Miners Will Demand an Eye for an Eye.

DENVER, Colo., May 20.—A statement has been issued by the executive board of the Federation of Miners relative to their views on the strike situation in Colorado and the imprisonment of the governor.

Concerning the infamy and barbarism of military rule in Colorado the statement says: "For six days the president of our organization has languished in the confines of a military camp."

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 20.—The Star today says: The present administration of the International Typographical Union was endorsed by the membership of the craft in Wednesday's election and Jas. M. Lynch was re-elected president to succeed himself as president by a majority estimated at between twelve and fifteen thousand.

INDIAN SYMPATHY FOR JAPS. LONDON, May 20.—The English newspaper reports the greatest regret and sympathy at Japan's ill-luck in losing two warships. LONDON, May 20.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says the Russians will draw back to Kaupaitse, concentrating Kukumen, 100 miles to the northeast, to support their new bases at Kalytan and Tieling.

THE JAPANESE LOSS. TOKIO, May 20.—The loss of life incurred by the sinking of the cruiser Yoshino, included Capt. Sasaki, Commander Hirotsugu, three first lieutenants, five second lieutenants, five midshipmen, a paymaster, surgeon, three engineers, cadets and eight boatswain mates.
