## PRIESTS IN FRANCE ARE HAD MANY TROUBLES NOT GREATLY EXCITED WITH HIS GIDDY WIVES

They Foresaw Trouble Coming and the An Aged German Whose Patience Was Present State of Affairs is Just Too Sorely Tried, Killed What Was Expected. His Wife.

ROME, Jan. 5.—The Messagero publishes the result of a series of inquiries in high ecclesiastical circles about the impression in Vatican circles on the French religious war. It is amazed at finding so few traces of indignation on the part of the prelates and their associates. The consensus of the replies of those best equipped to speak would appear to be something like this: "We were prepared for it, we knew it would come, but in of great benefit to the French Catholics as it will destroy the lamentable indifference which existed." The cardinal added: "The bill of separation is a bill of spoliation as the adversaries of the church only aim at gaining funds. Now the priests have every condemnation and will continue to say mass as before. The Pope remains serene. He is sure of the support of all of the cardinals and also of the French episcopate."

BERLIN, Jan. 5.—Herr Schmidt, a sixty-year-old capitalist, has been acquitted on the charge of murdering his forty-six-year-old wife. Herr Schmidt told a pathetic story in court of how his two wives had ruined his life by flirtations with other men. He divorced the first, but the second proved no better, and one night during the middle of the summer at the end of a bitter altercation in which the wife declared her unwillingness to mend her ways the husband pulled out a revolver and shot her dead. The woman had had relations with army officers and as a result of her intrigues several of them had been dragged before military courts and punished. She was the daughter of a provincial church dignitary and left several grown up children. Herr Schmidt in telling his story to the jury, declared that after his troubles with the first wife he had tried to be especially careful in the selection of his second wife and had brought her from a fine home to a fine home with an idea that environment did count and that marriage was not a lottery.

## SHOULD HAVE ACCEPTED THE OFFER WHEN IT WAS MADE

A Music Hall Singer Who Might Have Sold Her Paste Gems for a Pretty Good Price.

ROME, Jan. 5.—A curious incident occurred here some time ago when a traveling trunk was lost. The owner, a music hall singer, declared that it contained valuable effects and jewelry and she was finally offered \$25,000 in settlement of all claims, but refused. It so happened that pending negotiations the trunk was discovered and the order was at once given by the officials for a list of its contents. An expert jeweler was also requisitioned and his response was to the effect that the asserted precious diamonds were all false. The fact reached the ears of the owner who disappeared and has not been heard from since. A warrant for the arrest of the owner has been issued on the charge of having attempted to defraud the State railways.

## MOROCCAN VILLAGES BURNED BY TROOPS

Raisuli's Retreat Cut Off—Two Bands of Sultan's Forces Surrounding Him.

TANGIER, Morocco, Jan. 4.—The semaphores at Cape Spartel signalled this evening that villages in the direction of Zintat were burning and that firing had been heard from them. Sid Mohammed Gabbas, the minister of war, is encamped eight miles south of here, awaiting the arrival from Raisuli of the second column of the Sultan's army, under the command of Muley El Remi. As soon as the two forces meet an attempt will be made to cut off Raisuli's retreat in the direction of the mountain fastnesses. The Ben-M'Sur tribe is at Zintat, hemmed in on the north and south by columns of government troops. Their escape on the west toward Arzila, is prevented by a portion of the division under the minister of war, while the Rif tribes, who are hostile to Raisuli, encircle them on the east.

## WRESTLERS TRIED TO KILL EACH OTHER

BORDEAUX, Jan. 4.—An inquiry has been opened into an incident which recently occurred during the course of a wrestling performance in a Bordeaux music hall.

Prof. Royer and an amateur, named Witzner, were giving a display of Jujitsu when of a sudden for some reason not clear the performance was transferred into a sanguinary combat. When they were separated it was found that the professor's face had been beaten almost to a pulp and his left ear torn off. He was taken to a neighboring house to have his wounds dressed. The amateur, it was discovered upon examination had all his teeth broken by a head blow.

## LOVERS MADE USE OF WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

How a Parisian Couple Kept Up a Conversation

Until the Authorities Interfered and Forbade the Practice—No Private Systems Permitted.

PARIS, Jan. 5.—A strike has been declared by the studious lads of the Ecole Centrale, the principal engineering school, against the college cook. His cooking, they say, is so bad that it is a health. Accordingly they have decided to undermine his business. The beefsteaks, they complain, are as tough as shoe leather, and the fried potatoes as dry as straw. To bring him to terms they have for the past five days brought in their meals from the outside. The cook, who it seems is a sort of a restaurateur holding a Government concession, complains on the other hand that the young men are unreasonable. There are between 500 and 700 of them, and when meal time comes they all rush up and want their portions at once. How is he going to cook five hundred beefsteaks in a minute, he asks. It stands to reason that some of the steaks have to be cooked an hour or an half an hour before, and if meanwhile they, as well as the potatoes, become slightly dry, he is not responsible for the situation. The students, however, have not been impressed by this argument and the strike continues.

Paris had its brigands as they are found in some southern cities for they would have had a chance for a splendid exploit the other day when a protesting dove test, and as both are wending its way from the Gare Saint Lazare to a bank near the boulevards. The little caravan contained \$200,000 worth of American railway securities which had been shipped from New York and which have been deposited in Paris. It is needless to say that the treasure was carefully guarded by detectives.

Wireless telegraphy has found a new application. Paris is notably a place of communication between amorous couples across the house tops. The city is that the state broke in upon the secret and put an end to the romantic intercourse by threatening the fine and confiscating the apparatus. Two young couples, both aged eighteen, were on the roof of a house in the Boulevard Edgar Quinet. The distance which separated them was about three miles but this distance was easily traversed by the use of the wireless. Victor Hugo to the other pole erected on a six story house in the Boulevard Edgar Quinet the messages flew gall over the chimney tops and spanned the river. One of the first missives sent contained the address of each of the communications thereafter proceeded merrily every evening. But they had not counted on the government. An official stationer of the wireless post on the Eiffel Tower had perceived this competition with the wireless service of the state. Some days later inspectors arrived at the respective homes of the couples and carried away the offending apparatus with a warning that if the offense were repeated it would mean a heavy fine. After spending a few months in the United States a rich American lady returned the other day to Paris where she had lived previously with her husband, who, however, is rarely at home. She called at a Quai where she had left a garment before her departure. As she entered the mistress of the shop started up, stared as if she had seen a ghost, turned pale and fell in a dead faint. A work-girl ran into the room, blanched when she saw the American lady, screamed, hid her face and fled leaving her mistress on the floor. The customer was annoyed and started after the girl who only screamed the louder. "Don't touch me, you are dead! Let me go, I have done you no harm. Why should you haunt me now?" The American lady becoming more and more exasperated after a long argument finally succeeded in persuading everybody that she was alive and finally learned why she had been taken for a ghost. Her husband had been mourning her death for some months. She had, according to him, died in London shortly after leaving Paris. The infuriated wife set out to learn her husband's little game and first of all found him installed in their summer villa at Dieppe with a strange lady who passed as his second consort. Later on she learned that he had engineered an elaborate hoax.

## BRIEF DESPATCHES.

FORT DODGE, Iowa, Jan. 4.—Started by a friend who suddenly slapped him on the back, A. R. Hayden, of Gilmore City, slipped on an icy pavement and fell, sustaining injuries that caused his death an hour later. Hayden was a former politician in Humboldt County.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—The local carpenter's union declared a boycott against the Japanese today. Any member of the union who employs Japanese labor, patronizes Japanese merchants, or purchases goods from employers of Japanese is to be fined \$10.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—Three persons are dead as a result of eating canned beans. Henry Cartier, Ontario, and his daughter died today, while Charles Abbott died yesterday. They ate the beans while on a camping trip. All were able to return home before they died.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 4.—The Duke of Orleans has announced to his friends here that he intends to start a new expedition next spring in the ship Belgica to penetrate as far as possible along the northeast coast of Greenland. The purpose of this expedition is to join the Danish expedition under Mylius Eriksen, which left here last June to explore the coast.

PRESQUE ISLE, Me., Jan. 4.—The Presque Isle stable, conducted by E. B. Taylor, tonight burned together with 200 bushels of grain and 10 tons of hay. The loss is about \$2,200, insured.

The 31 horses in the stable were saved with difficulty, Clem Thompson, one of the rescuers, nearly losing his life.

The fire started around the chimney in the stable office. WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Sir Chen-chung Liang Chen, the Chinese minister today had a conference at the State Department with Secretary Root, at which the reported attempt to revive the anti-American boycott in China was touched upon. The minister expressed his confidence in the ability and disposition of the government to prevent such a movement, at least so far as it involved the holding of mass meetings. He believed that the agitation at present is confined to a few persons who always are disaffected and endeavoring to make trouble between China and other nations.

DANVILLE, Va., Jan. 4.—Fred Amato, an Italian, was indicted by the Grand Jury at Chatham today for a triple murder, which occurred at a railway camp at Motleys on Dec. 23. The victims of the murder were Joe Petrello, an Italian laborer, Maggie Sullivan, with whom he lived as man and wife, and her 12-year-old son, Lawrence Sullivan.

PAID DETECTIVES \$30,000 FOR WATCHING HER HUSBAND. Mrs. Hartle puts in a claim for expenses in her recent divorce case. PITTSBURG, Jan. 4.—Judge Robert S. Fraser later today heard the petition of Mrs. Mary Scott Hartle, demanding counsel's fees and alimony from her husband, Augustus Hartle, the millionaire paper manufacturer, of this city. Counsel for Hartle presented to the court the answer to the petition. Mrs. Hartle avers that the detectives cost alone upward of \$30,000. Judge Fraser informed Mrs. Hartle, representing Mrs. Hartle, that there should be some information given to the court in regard to the \$30,000 expenses incurred for detectives. "I do not ask that you make a detailed account that will reveal what you are doing in any other case," said the court, "but we wish some information which will enable us to judge as to what is a reasonable amount."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—It was learned today from trustworthy unofficial sources, that the department of justice will very soon in the United States courts in San Francisco introduce a bill in effect asking the court to enforce the provisions of the existing treaty between the United States and Japan which in effect, it is asserted, guarantees to Japanese children the same rights in the public schools of the United States, as are accorded to children of all parents. It will be insisted that the recent action of the San Francisco school board in segregating Japanese children is a violation of our treaty with Japan and holds that the school authorities are amenable.

SOUTHERN INDIANA THREATENED BY FLOODS. INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—Southern Indiana tonight is threatened with floods. From several places come reports of great numbers of persons moving out of the lowlands. Much suffering is already reported. The Ohio river at Evansville tonight stood at 37 feet, two feet above the danger line. Weather Forecaster Brand is quoted as predicting a stage of forty feet. For a hundred miles along the Ohio river, the lowlands are under water. At Princeton, Ind., the Wabash and the White Rivers are overflowing the lowlands. The Patoka river is also out of bounds. Fifteen public schools were closed today on account of the high water. At Taylorsville, opposite Terra Haute, the Wabash river caused 700 inhabitants to seek higher ground.
