LOCAL.

Fixed Valuation.

The Treasury Board yesterday decided to accede to the request of the Maritime Mail Works for a fixed valuation on their property on the basis of the present assessment. The valuation will be for ten years.

Will Build Here.

The Petrie Manufacturing Company of Hamilton, Ont., manufacturers of Magnet Cream Separators will erect a warehouse and offices here for the accommodation of the trade of the maritime provinces. A. R. Petrie was here last week and purchased a lot of land on Prince William street adjoining the Salvation Army Metropole as a site for the buildings.

Died in Vancouver.
