HARBOR MOTOR PARADE AND BOAT RACE A GRAND SUCCESS

The harbor presented a gay sight last evening. All of the shipping were decorated with flags and the harbor front was crowded with thousands of people, while there were hundreds of small boats on the water.

The events which caused so much interest were the procession of motor boats by the St. John Power Boat Club and the motor boat race for the Norton Griffith trophy.

About 6:30 o'clock while the weather was ideal the procession took place. Headed by Commodore S. P. Gerow in his steam yacht Lolita, about 35 club boats formed in line and after coming through the falls, proceeded along the eastern shore and then up along the west side. A brass band accompanied the yachts and the parade reflected great credit on the commodore and other members of the club.

At seven o'clock the flagship Lolita and the government cruiser Curlew steamed into position at the starting point which was at the head of the harbor and six motor boats were started in a most exciting race. The boats were all very speedy and the spectators were given a treat as they witnessed the small craft flying through the water.

The course was from the head of the harbor, round the bell buoy at the eastward of Partridge Island, back to the head of the harbor, thence round the red buoy at the entrance to Courtney Bay and to the finish in the bay.

The Patricia, owned by J. H. Barton, was first; the Cachou, owned by Harold W. Kinsman and Peter Clinch, was second; Silver Spray, A. R. Cruikshank, third; Psyche, Charles Merritt, fourth; Mildred W. George R. Wetmore, fifth. The Tonge, owned by S. L. Gregory, broke down after going over about three quarters of the course and did not finish. The following is the official summary of the race:

RAIN INTERFERES WITH PICNIC PLANS

Electric Storm Mars Success of Sunday School Outing at Hopewell—School Trustees are Elected.

Hopewell, July 10.—A largely attended Sunday school picnic was held at the Cape Rocks yesterday, teams conveying a big number from this locality to the much famed resort at the shore town. A terrific electrical storm accompanied by a tremendous downpour of rain, interfered somewhat with the enjoyment of the day.

At the school meeting held in the Hopewell Hill district on Monday, J. R. Russell was elected trustee to fill the vacancy and Fred G. Moore auditor. The sum of \$450.00 was voted for teachers' salaries and fuel, and \$40 for repairs.

Miss Martha Berry of Berry's Mills, who had been in the village for a couple of weeks, received word of the sudden death of her mother on Tuesday. Miss Berry left at once for her home.

Mr. and Mrs. Collicut, formerly of Eigh, Albert Co., but now residents of Calgary, visited friends in the village this week. Mr. Collicut has been in the West over twenty years.

Hawkesbury, three-quarters of a mile distant, would also have been destroyed. There has been no rain for two weeks, and everything was dry as tinder. Burning shingles were carried to Port Hawkesbury and half a dozen small fires were started which the people were able to control. Then the wind died down just in time.

The Point Tupper fire destroyed all the Intercolonial Railway freight and passenger stations, the transfer terminals, a great many cars loaded and unloaded, two hotels and six or seven houses. The loss to the Intercolonial Railway alone will be about \$150,000.
