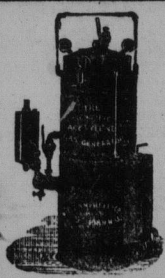

COMMISSIONERS WILL ATTEND FUNERAL OF LATE FIREMAN

Reduction of West Side Guards Again Laid Over—Commissioner Fisher wants to Buy Street Railway.

The city council met in committee yesterday morning and talked over several matters without coming to a decision in any of them.

The reduction of the West Side guards was again on the carpet and laid over until today. Commissioner Fisher suggested that the city buy the St. John Street Railway and asked for \$2,200 from general revenue for the disposal of garbage.

The mayor reported that he was sending three patients to the sanatorium at River Glade at the expense of the municipality and his action was approved.

Commissioner McAllister referred to the loss by death of John P. McDrew, chief of the West Side fire department, which he characterized as serious, and suggested that the council meet in the morning in order to be free to attend the funeral of the late chief in the afternoon. Commissioner McAllister suggested that some of the committee meetings be held in the afternoon at four o'clock instead of having them all in the morning and this will be further considered today.

ENOCH LESTER PASSES AWAY

Was Cousin of Sir George E. Foster, and for Years a Highly Esteemed Resident of King's Co.

Apohaqui, Feb. 5.—A telegram from West Hanson, Mass., conveying the news of the death of Enoch Lester has been received by relatives here. The late Mr. Lester was a native of this county, being born on August 16th, 1832, and consequently was in his 85th year. He was a son of the late John and Mary Lester. His mother, before marriage, was Miss Mary Foster, an aunt of Sir George E. Foster, the deceased therefore being a cousin of that prominent statesman. At the time of his birth his parents resided in the old Lester homestead at Millstream, but after a few years removed to Keirstead Mountain, situated a short distance from and overlooking the village of Collins.

Twice Married.

Deceased was twice married. His first wife was Miss Anna O'Neill of Belleisle, this union being blessed by one son, John Lester, who grew to manhood but after a brief illness of appendicitis passed away, which was a crushing blow to his father.

His second wife was Miss Lydia Kelly who survives. Four daughters were the result of this union, viz., Mrs. E. W. Kierstead, Mrs. Leslie Hayward, Mrs. Harry Hamilton and Mrs. Leon Freeman, all of whom have passed away except Mrs. Freeman with whom the aged parents had recently made their home. Besides the widow and daughters two sisters survive, Mrs. David Kelly, Collins, and Mrs. Thomas Wilson of Millstream, the brothers having all gone before. The late gentleman was a successful farmer and having accumulated ample means, he sold his valuable property at Keirstead Mountain some ten years ago, to spend his declining years in well earned ease. For several years he resided at Collins but about eight years ago he and his esteemed wife left the homeland and removed to the United States to spend the residue of their days with their only daughter, Mrs. Freeman.

Highly Esteemed.

In the passing of this venerable old man another of the landmarks is removed. The memory of his noble life will live on in the minds of those who had known him best, being one who was firm on the side of right and had the courage of his convictions. He was a consistent member and liberal supporter of the Baptist church and in politics had always been a staunch Conservative. The remains will arrive here on Wednesday afternoon by C. P. R. at 3.30 o'clock and be conveyed to Collins where interment will take place in the family lot. Rev. L. J. Tingley will conduct the last rites.

LATIN AMERICA TO SUPPORT PRES. WILSON

Santiago, Chile, Feb. 5.—President Wilson's action toward Germany is approved in Chile, says the Mercurio; it adds: "Latin America, bound to the United States with strong ties, today more than ever before must support President Wilson." The newspaper urges the Chilean government to find a common ground on which the nations of South America may second the action of Mr. Wilson.

WOULD LIKE TO MEET THIS RET. SOLDIER

Charles Robinson Can Place Him in a Position if Case is Genuine One.

Charles Robinson, secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Commission, last night drew the attention of The Standard to a want advertisement which has been appearing in the Times as follows:

"Returned soldier, (sixteen months in France), desires position as time-keeper, checker, shipper or any position of trust. Box D, Times office." Mr. Robinson said that he would like very much to meet this returned soldier and if this were a genuine case he could soon place him in a position, as he had a card up in the rooms of the European War Veterans' Association now for some time for just such a man.

The association do not know who the man advertising in the Times is and so far as they could find out he is not a member of that body.

The Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission for this province has placed a large number of men in positions, and if any returned soldier will apply to the secretary every effort will be made to get a position for him but Mr. Robinson said they could hardly be held responsible for not placing men who did not come to them, and from the fact that the E. W. V. Association did not know who the man who was advertising was, he was inclined to think that it was not genuine.

Newcastle, Feb. 5.—Mr. Richard Grant, the oldest resident of Newcastle, died Wednesday afternoon, aged 99 years. He was a native of County Kildare, Ireland, and came to this country when about eleven years old. He had resided in Newcastle the last twenty-five years. He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Matilda Cormier of Richibucto, and three children, Harry, William, and Alice, all at home. One sister, Mrs. Thomas Hockett, of Kouchibouguac, Kent county, also survives. Mr. Grant came from a long lived family, all his deceased brothers and sisters having lived about 90 years or more. The funeral will be held this afternoon, to St. Mary's church.

Mr. Likely was in the sixty-ninth year of his age and had been employed in the linen room of M. R. A. Ltd., for the last four years. Prior to his coming to the city to reside he was in the employ of the Alexander Gibson company, of which firm he was manager for more than twenty-five years. Besides his wife he is survived by three sons, three daughters, two brothers and one sister. The daughters are Miss Belle of Duluth, Minnesota; and the Misses Laura and Margaret at home. The sons are F. B. Likely, now in France, and Charles and Arthur of Montreal; the brothers are John of British Columbia and Joseph A. of this city. The sister is Miss Catherine, at home.

The funeral will take place Wednesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

William P. Reardon.
After an illness of two weeks of pneumonia, William P. Reardon died on Saturday at his home, 29 Suffolk street, West St. John. He was a ship laborer and was a member of the Longshoremen's Union. He leaves his wife, three sons, William and John of the city and Joseph of North Bay, Ontario, and one daughter, Eileen, at home.

The funeral will be held from his late residence tomorrow morning at 8.15 o'clock.
