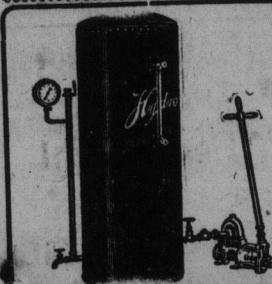

## 94 ENLISTED DURING WEEK IN PROVINCE

Lt.-Col. McAvity's Weekly Statement—A Falling Off As Compared with Previous Week.

The total number of men secured in the province last week was ninety-four. This is not as good as the preceding week, when over one hundred rallied to the flag. For the same week last year 288 men signed the honor roll. Of last week's total St. John contributed forty-one. For the same week in 1916 but forty-one enlisted in the city. A noticeable feature in the total last week is that the men are not taking to the infantry units as they are to other branches of the service. Out of the ninety-four men but twenty-eight of the number are enlisted in overseas infantry combatant units.

## CONSUL OF CUBA AT ROTARY CLUB

Caesar A. Barranco Gives Interesting Address on Cuba and Canada at Luncheon Yesterday.

Caesar A. Barranco, the Consul of Cuba, was the speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club yesterday, and he gave a most interesting address on the subject "Cuba and Canada." To the American people, he said, "was due eternal gratitude for the noble work they did in the liberation of Cuba, and the Canadian people in the development of the island by building of railways, which has made Cuba one of the most important countries in Latin America."

The speaker paid a warm tribute to Sir William Van Horne, who, with his associates had expended millions in the island, and his name is dear to the hearts of the Cubans, and before long a monument will be erected in the city of Camaguey, the place he loved so well.

Speaking on the economic and commercial growth of Cuba, the consul said that the growth since the establishment of the republic in 1902 has been remarkable. The exports from and imports into Cuba in 1902 and 1914-15 follows:

Fiscal year Exports. Imports.  
1901-2 .. \$ 61,074,000 \$ 62,203,000  
1914-15 .. 214,814,000 222,813,000

Figures for the fiscal year 1915-16 are not yet available, but for the past calendar year exports amounted to \$236,228,000 and imports \$140,885,000. The bulk of the foreign trade is with the United States, which consumes over 80 per cent. of the island produce and furnishes nearly sixty per cent. of her imports.

Since Cuba's independence imports from England have increased 75 per cent., while the trade from Canada is over \$6,000,000.

The consul closed his address with a number of words of trade with Cuba.

On motion of R. E. Armstrong a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker.
