The yards at Sand Point have only seconmodation for about 250 cattle that can be fed at one time. If there are 400 cattle for a steamer, 150 have to stand out in the open yard on large clinkers, making them foot-sore, from which they do not recover before they land in England.

The 250 cattle have to be taken out of the sheds and put in the yards to stand on, the clinkers, and get foot-sore the same as the others. The 150 have to be driven in the sheds when the others are taken out, to eat the balance of the hay that is left by the other cattle, and, therefore, get mixed and go back with the other cattle, as the yards are too small to keep them separate.

Any of the ships of the Elder-Dempster,
