Opposition, regardless of which party sat on that side, have risen to say, "We are asked to put through a bill involving billions of dollars in the dying moments of the session without time for adequate consideration."

I recall hearing this kind of speech made when I was a student at university, when Senator Choquette and I used to come here at times to listen to the debates. Such speeches were still being made when I came here as a senator many years later.

So, to hear what Senator Aseltine said this afternoon warms me deeply indeed. The credit for this goes to the co-operation and willingness of the Senate to deal with these financial matters in a responsible way, through the work done by the Finance Committee with its very able chairman and informed members. So it is that much of the stigma that has been attached to the Senate in respect of appropriation bills has, as a result of the work of this committee, ceased to be a matter of public comment.

This is a great step forward and it is particularly gratifying to have an experienced person, a former leader of the Senate, like Senator Aseltine, make the kind of remarks he does. I am delighted.

May I at this stage congratulate the new Deputy Leader of the Senate (Honourable Mr. Deschatelets) on his orderly and masterly presentation of this bill. Believe me, I am going to be very reluctant in the future to take another appropriation bill myself after what I have heard this afternoon.

Hon. Senators: Hear, hear.

Motion agreed to and bill read second time.

## THIRD READING

The Hon. the Speaker: When shall this bill be read the third time?

Hon. Mr. Deschatelets: Honourable senators, with leave of the Senate, I move that the bill be read the third time now.

Motion agreed to and bill read third time and passed.
