In reply to your letter of the 17<sup>th</sup> Instant enclosing one from Mr. St. MacDonald I am directed to observe no reference having been made to Buildings in the Case of the Fishing Islands his claim cannot be admitted as a matter of right, but that the delay in issuing that document having been caused partly by the confusion consequent on the substitution of Mr. Kennedy's name for Mr. Webster as Lessee and partly by some objections offered by the Indians to the transaction the Governor General is willing that the loss sustained hereby should be apportioned equally between the parties and that Mr. MacDonald be therefore allowed to retain £4-10 out of the past years rent.

5555. Sir, I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 16<sup>th</sup> Instant enclosing a further communication from the Rev. Mr. Marcoux respecting the mode of payment of the sum due by the St. Louis and Province Line Railroad Company for land within the Indian Territory of Canbywaya required by them for Railway purposes. From the tenor of the Rev. Mr. Marcoux's remarks he seems to have overlooked the concluding paragraph of my letter of the 5<sup>th</sup> Instant in which the claim of the Indians through whose Lands the Line may pass for compensation out of such monies is distinctly admitted. You will be pleased to refer to explain this point
