APPENDIX V.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

TABLES SHOWING VALUES AND TONNAGE OF PRINCIPAL ARTICLES OF EXPORT AND IMPORT BETWEEN NEWFOUNDLAND AND OTHER COUNTRIES.

THE accompanying tables have been prepared in order to show the importance of Oversea communications, their protection and maintenance, to Newfoundland. Newfoundland, while dependent upon certain commodities which are produced abroad, is, in her turn, under the necessity of exporting the commodities which she produces to pay for her imports.

Table I shows the imports and exports by countries in values for the year ending the 30th June, 1921.

Table II shows the more bulky and valuable imports and exports by weight (where this is known) for the same year. In the case of textiles, timber and wheat, the total weights could not be ascertained, as they are not published in the trade returns.
