Sir,

With further reference to my Circular of the 28<sup>th</sup> August last, relative to the advisability of purchasing raw hides, instead of dressed leather, for the use of destitute Indians; I have the honor to inform you that it seems desirable that this should be done.

You may, therefore, purchase of raw hides, of good quality, which you will then hand over to any Indians whom you may deem best able to thoroughly dress them; and when done, they are to be returned into your store, for issue, as mocassin-leather, in the usual manner. The Indians to be paid for dressing each hide, by having leather given to them; and, if this should prove impracticable, you may pay in cash, up to \$1<sup>25</sup> per hide.

The raw hides should not cost more than \$2<sup>50</sup>; and in many districts can be purchased as low as \$1<sup>25</sup> each.
