How old are you? A. 34, sir. Your Defending Officer has to hear your answers so speak up please. What did you do before you joined the army Leonard? What type of All kinds of work, sir, from 1921 until I joined the army. A. 0. Give me an example. I worked in Eatons in the stock room before I joined the army. h. Q. Here your wages very high? 25 dollars a week and cost of living bunus. \$29.60 a week, sir. A. Why did you go absent without leave? Q. A. This time, sir? 0. I am not suggesting you went absent before? I went so I could earn money to help my wife. A. You mean that your wife was getting insufficient money to support herself and child? A. Yes, sir. Q. How much was she getting? A. \$57.27 a month, sir. Has she been getting that ever since you have been in the army? Q. .No, sir. The first three or four months she received \$71.12 a A. Q. Your pay account shows that your wife drew \$57.20 plus \$10.00, plus \$10.00 essigned pay a month since you enlisted? That is wrong, sir. She received \$71.12 a month for three or four A. I ment you to remember you are under oath. You are absolutely sure Q. that is correct? A. Yes, sir. Now, did you know what amount of ellowance your mother riceived from the Dependents Allowence Board? A. Yes, sir, for the first child \$13.92, the second child \$12.00 and the third \$10.00 out of my assigned pay. Your pay account doesn't show the Ord child your wife received money for. Mould you say that is wrong too? Your mother received 35.92 in trust for the two children. I don't know, sir, they sent a check out for my mother to make up that money.
