cipal signs will recognize it at sight-through its double undulating curve-as a hard sibilant which, being affected by no modification and pointing to the right, must be given the primary bissing sound Sa. Let us now insert therein the perpendicular line which, when used as an internal accretion to a sign, corresponds to the h of the Roman alphabet (as in  $\triangleleft$  rha, € hwa, () tha, () kha), and we obtain () sha. By crossing the end of its horizontal line, we add a  $\tau$  to that sign which then becomes a tsha or cha. In like manner,  $\cong$  may be changed into  $\cong$  tsa, which in its turn is liable to be transformed into a t'sa, while C, E, &c. may become C, S, &c. by the insertion of the one sign ( representing the same click proper to some Indian languages, etc., etc.

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To come now to the present work. It is, as its title indicates, considerably more than a simple prayerbook. The prayers, hymns, catechisms and religious instructions it contains are, in their entirety, the property of the undersigned.
