TORNADO KILLED MANY.

Village of St. Charles, Minn., Was Destroyed.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 5.-A tornado swept through this State and parts of Michigan and Minnesota Saturday afternoon, and the following summary of despatches received here show with what result :-

The tornado struck St. Charles, Minn., a place with 1,500 inhabitants, and ruined the town. Seven persons

and ruined the town. Seven persons were killed and twenty-eight injured. The entire main street of St. Charles was literally wiped out. Hardly a business place is left standing. Forty-two residences were destroyed.

Two were killed, three fatally injured and a score of others badly hurt at Independence, Wis., and the surrounding country. Many farm buildings were torn down. At Eagle Valley, north of La Crosse, the Reformed Church was destroyed, and he see on the prairie surrounding were demolished.
