BERKSHIRE, July 14.—In the dilemma of the next case on the docket, the court has to choose between *Williams v. Williams*, which was taken up today. The defendant while R. B. 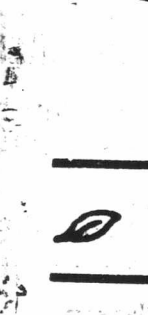
