

New York Tribune Says "Germany Is Beaten"

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—A cable to the Tribune from London says New York Tribune's editorial on "Germany is beaten" has been carried here at great length and is giving considerable prominence in London papers. The Daily News says it has always been extraordinarily difficult ever since war began, for people in this country obtain a clear view of course of the struggle as it presents itself to impartial judgment of neutrals.

With one phase of neutral opinion the British public from the first has been kept very fully informed. It is represented admirably in extremely able and cogent article which has just appeared in the New York Tribune. Daily Express says we are unable to accept optimistic conclusion; New York Tribune, that Germany is already beaten, we have learned too much of the skill and determination of the enemy to allow ourselves again to believe the comfortable illusion. Nevertheless we may go so far with the friendly American critic as to agree that there is increasing assurance that Germany will assuredly be beaten unless we continue to blunder or fail in our purpose.

A Sad Case

Yesterday by the Shore train Const. H. Humber arrived from Manuels with a girl aged 17, who is charged with the larceny of a bracelet and watch owned by a resident of the shore. We hear that the child, for she is only a child, was driven to the commission of the act by privation and want. She resides with her mother, and her brother was one of our brave Naval men who went down in the H. M. S. Clan McNaughton, while her father is ill in hospital.

Preventive Officer Hurt

On Wednesday last as Mr. John Carew, preventive officer at Cape Broyle was driving from the city into Cape Broyle, in going down the hill leading to the station, some of the horse's traces snapped and the whole outfit went down to the landwash with a rush. It became jammed between a stage and the wharf and Mr. Carew was severely crushed about the chest and narrowly escaped death. He has since been confined to his home and is being attended by a doctor.

Suffered Nasty Accident

Yesterday afternoon as Mr. A. S. Hodder, son of Mr. W. J. Hodder, painter, was doing some work at the windows of his house, he slipped and fell and drove his right arm through a large pane of glass. He was severely cut, severed the main artery, and before Dr. Scully and another physician who was summoned arrived, lost a great deal of blood. The wounds received were stitched, but Mr. Hodder will not be able to use his arm for some time.

Apparently Insane

Last evening the police were called to a city wharf where they placed under arrest a man named Thos. Tizzard. Attention was drawn to his peculiar action in counting repeatedly a number of barrels of apples on the wharf. He is evidently insane and the police could not get him to say whether he belonged to the city or otherwise. He will be examined by a doctor as to his mental state.

Police Join Volunteers

Three of the members of the city police force—Consts. Walsh, Duke and Collins—recently handed in their resignations and received under the circumstances an immediate discharge. The men who are fine strapping fellows enlisted in H. Co. of our Volunteer force to fight for King and Empire.

"Going Some"

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—What is said to be the fastest speed ever made on a track attained here yesterday over Shep's Head Bay speed-way, when Ralph Leplanna drove his car one lap in one minute and fourteen seconds, an average speed of about 116 miles an hour.

This eclipses the best American record of an average of 111 miles, made by Barney Oldfield, at Chicago.

The French Occupy Strumitza

LONDON, Oct. 30.—A despatch to Exchange Telegraph Co. from Athens says: "It is learned from a good source that the French, after three days fighting, have occupied Strumitza, and advanced 32 kilometres (about 20 miles) into Bulgarian territory.

The Bulgarians have lost heavily.

Kitchener Dines Joffre At St. James Palace

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Earl Kitchener gave a dinner at St. James' Palace last night in honor of Gen. Joffre. A distinguished company were present to meet the French Commander-in-Chief.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—The Prince of Wales arrived at Buckingham Palace this afternoon, on leave from France. The Prince was in close attendance on his father during the King's inspection of his troops at the front.

It is believed the Prince returned for the purpose of reassuring Queen Mary as to the King's condition. His presence here is taken as a confirmation of the statement that the accident is not serious.
