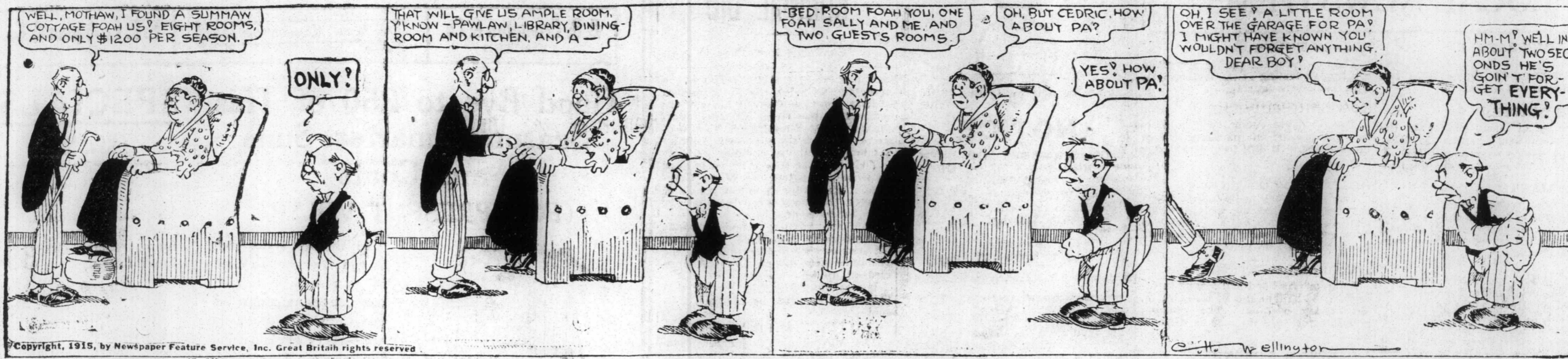

Washington Notifies Berlin of American Ships in the War Zone. Washington, June 29—The United States has adopted the practice of notifying the German admiralty through Ambassador Gerard of the time of departure of every passenger ship sailing the American flag and approximately the hours during which it will pass through the war zone.
