Washington, Jan. 31.-Senator Wellington, by request, today introduced a joint resolution for an amendment Up Fortymile in Spite to the constitution limiting private fortunes to \$10,000,000 and providing or the forfeiture to the government of any excess of that amount as a public nuisance, folly or peril. The preamble to the resolution recites :

Whereas, The private fortunes into which the national wealth is being congested, gigantic though they be, are as yet only in their infancy; and, being transmitted practically incorporate and intact, these fortunes are in process of redoubling, by com round interest and compound dividends, from the present hundre's of millions of dollars each into eventually thousands of millions of dollareach, already an offense aguir pu! lic policy, simple justice, vital religion and common sense; and,
