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THE MARKETS.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—There were about 400 head of butchers' cattle calves and 50 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the east end abattoir to-day. The butchers came out in large numbers, and trade was brisk, while the prices continued as high as at last Tuesday's market. Six prime steers were sold at 5 1/2 to 6 lb. and several others, not so good, at from 4 3/4 to 5c per lb.; pretty good cattle sold at from 3 3/4 to 4 1/2 to 5 lb. and common stock at 2 3/4 to 3 1/2 per lb. The calves were all rather young veals, and sold at from \$3 to \$5 each. Sheep sold at from \$3 1/4 to \$3 1/2 per lb. lambs at from 4 1/4 to 4 3/4 per lb. Fat hogs sold at from 6 1/4 to 6 1/2 per lb. for good straight lots, weighed off the cars.

BUFFALO GRAIN MARKET.

Buffalo, Feb. 11.—Flour, quiet and steady, best patents, spring, \$1.25 to \$1.50. Rye flour, \$3.25 to \$4. Wheat—Spring, higher. No. 1 northern, spot, 82 1/4c; winter, dull; No. 2, red 90 1/2c asked. Corn unsettled; No. 2 corn, 63 1/4c; No. 3 do, 63c. Oats, dull; No. 2 white, 47 1/2c; No. 3 do, 47c; No. 2 mixed, 45 1/2c; No. 3 do, 45c. Barley, spot, offered 64c to 65c. Rye, No. 1, 68c in store.

TORONTO FRUITS.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—There was good demand for all seasonable fruits and prices are steady. We quote: Apples, 2c to 35c per basket, and \$2.50 to \$4.50 per per bbl. Malaga Grapes, \$6 to \$7 per keg. Bananas, per bunch, \$1.25 to \$2. Lemons, per box, \$2.50 to \$2.75. Mexican oranges, \$2.25 per box; Floridians, \$3.25 per box. Cranberries, per basket, \$1.25, per bbl., \$10. Spanish onions per case \$1.15.

TORONTO GRAIN MARKET.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—Wheat—The market is quiet, red and white sold to-day at 73 1/2c middle freight. Some hold at 74c, middle freight. Some hold-holders are asking a cent more. On the local call board No. 2 goose wheat sold at 63 1/4c middle on a low freight to New York. Spring wheat is quiet at 72c for No. 1, east. Manitoba is steady; No. 1 hard is quoted at 87c. No. 1 northern at 83c, sold to-day at that price, and No. 2 northern at 80c. g. l. t. Sorghum, No. 1 55c was asked and 56c bid for No. 1 hard, g. l. t., and 79c bid for No. 1 northern on spot North Bay.

Flour—Dull dull; 90 per cent patent sack offering at \$2.90 in buyers' bags, middle freight. Choice brands steady, cars of Hungarian patents are quoted at \$4.20 and strong bakers' at \$4 in car lots, sacks included, on the track, Toronto.

Millfeed is steady at \$19 for shorts and \$17 for bran in bulk, middle freight. Manitoba millfeed is steady at \$25 for shorts and \$20 for bran, sacks included, Toronto, freight. Barley—Is steady; No. 3 sold on call at 51 1/2c on a low freight to New York. No. 1 is nominal at 56c. No. 2 is quoted at 54c, and No. 3 extra at 52c, middle freight.

Backwheat is steady at 53 1/2c middle freight. Rye is unchanged at 55c east and 56c middle freight. Corn—Is steady, on call to-day, 56c was bid for Canada, mixed and 56 1/2c for yellow, with sellers of yellow at 56c west. Oats are quiet at 43 3/4c for No. 2, white, low freight. Oatmeal—Is steady at \$5.25 for cars of bags and \$5.40 for barrels, and 25c more for broken lots.

Pears—Are steady at 80c, middle freight.

TORONTO PRODUCE.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—Butter—The market continues strong for creameries and weak for dairies. The former are of good quality and the latter are still largely medium and low grade. Creamery prints, 21 to 22c. Creamery rolls 18 to 21c. Dairy pound rolls 16 to 17c. Dairy, large rolls, choice, 16 to 16 1/2c. Dairy, tubs, 14c. Dairy, medium and low, 10c to 12 1/2c.

Eggs—New laid are coming in liberally and the market is easier. Demand is quite good. Prices are—For case lots of strictly guaranteed new laid, 24c to 25c. Fresh gathered, or lots of new laid, with held or fresh gathered, mixed lots, are quoted at 22 to 23c.

Potatoes—Offerings are not numerous and the market is drab. Cars on the track were quoted at 65c. Potatoes, out on store sell at 75c.

Poultry—There is only a light demand, and offerings are largely of frozen stock, and only intermittent at that. Fresh killed turkeys are quoted at 11 to 12c, and chickens at 70c to 80c. Frozen turkeys are quoted at 9 to 10 cents and chickens at 25c to 50c. Ducks are quoted at 90c to \$1 and geese at 8c to 9c.

TORONTO HAY AND STRAW.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—Baled Hay—There is a fairly strong market, with liberal offerings. Cars on the track here are \$9.75 to \$10.25 for choice timothy at \$9 to \$9.50 for medium. Holders are asking a little more than this, but the market is steady at these figures.

Baled Straw—Demand is good and the market is steady. Offerings are liberal. Cars on the market at \$5 to \$5.50.
