SOME VALUABLE HINTS

The large number of cases of tyhold fever in the city of Winnipeg have caused the civic health department to take steps to stay spread of the epidemic. The latest nove has been to issue to householders a circular urging certain precautions in the preparation of food, and general cleanliness. The circu-

Dear Sar or Madam,—Typhoid fever is caused, in the vast majority of cases, by water, milk or food becoming poisoned, by the germs of a arc-

water and milk are the two articles most particularly infected with

eles most particularly infected with typhoid.

Heat kills the typhoid poison, therefore, if your drinking water is not from a source by and suspicion boil it for 25 or 30 minutes.

Protect your smilk from contamination by dust or flies, or Pasteurize it, that is, heat to 158 Fahr. or 70 Centigrade. Keep it at this temperature 15 minutes, and then cool rapidly.

Dirty hands may also carry typhoid infection, therefore, wash your hands carefully before allowing them to come in contact with food stuffs of any kind.

Wash thoroughly all vegetables that are intended to be eaten raw, wash in water of known purity, or water which has been boiled and cooled.
