### CIVIC COMMISSION

Macaulay Club Decides in Favor of one Being Established—A Good Debate

A very interesting debate was held by the Macaulay Club last Saturday evening. There was a good attendance of members, and the evening was one of enjoyment and profit. The debate for the evening was one of general interest—"Resolved that government by commission is in the public interest, and should replace the present government by City Councils."

Will Foreman was the leader for the affirmative, and Will McCortie the leader for the negative. The speakers were—Affirmative, Messrs. Foreman, Chinick, H. Collins, Fred Stone, H. D. Smith, S. B. Arnold and C. E. Beaton. Negative, Messrs. McCortie, H. Jackson, Dr. Mussion, J. Lane, F. D. Laurin, and Edwin Bell.

During the debate the chair was occupied by the vice president, R. W. Angus, and at the conclusion of the argument, which was spirited on both sides, the decision was given in favor of the affirmative.

The meeting next Saturday evening will be held in the Oddfellows' Block, where the club has secured rooms for the winter. Besides the debate, an address will be given by Fred Stone, on the subject of "The preacher from the Plymouth standpoint."

#### Norway's Parliament Opens.

Christiania, Norway, Oct. 23.—The newly-elected Parliament was opened yesterday by King Haakon, in the presence of Queen Maud and the diplomatic corps. The King said he rejoiced at the "great good-will shown by foreign countries towards our fatherland since the establishment of its independence," and spoke hopefully of Norway's future prospects.

#### Lineman's Frightful Death.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—A young man named Kelly, an employee of the Montreal Park & Island Railway, missed his footing, and in trying to prevent himself from falling, seized hold of a live wire. Sparks were noticed flying from his hands, and in the twinkling of an eye the deadly wires were embedded in the flesh of his hands with fatal results.

#### Posts Failure Notice and Suicides.

London, Oct. 23.—P. MacFadyen, head of MacFadyen & Co., whose suspension was announced Saturday, committed suicide within an hour after posting the notice of the failure on the door of the bank by throwing himself before a train in a tunnel about half a mile away from his place of business. His body was shockingly mutilated.

#### Masked Bandits Get \$2,400.

Minneapolis, Oct. 23.—Masked bandits held a crowd of excited citizens at bay for three hours Sunday night at Sawyer, N. D., while companions blew a safe in the Sawyer Bank, and took from it \$2,400. Over 300 shots were fired. The robbers escaped on horseback.

#### Submarine Sprang a Leak.

Paris, Oct. 23.—The naval court enquiry at Bizerta, Tunis, has officially attributed to the Ministry of Marine its theory that the submarine boat Lutin sprang a leak in her stern, which destroyed her equilibrium and that she thereupon sunk and filled.

#### Carthagenian Refloated.

Philadelphia, Oct. 23.—The British ship Carthagenian, from Glasgow, which went aground on Thursday in the Delaware Bay, was floated yesterday afternoon. She is apparently undamaged.

got out and purchased a bottle of whiskey. We did not drink anything from the bottle till we got near the Baldwin bridge, when he asked me to draw the cork. It was while I was busy doing this that the two men jumped up from some place and stopped the horses. The men did not ask us to hand over our money, as was alleged. They didn't say anything. I jumped out of the rig to drive them off, and it was while attempting this that I got slashed. When I was getting into the rig the man gave me another jab in the leg with his knife.

"Lague never left the rig, and the report that he used the whip to drive my assistant away is incorrect. There was no whip in the rig."

"I have no idea as to who my assailant was. I don't think I have an enemy in the world, and as to whether they were lying for Lague or not I cannot say. They must certainly have had some object in attacking us. I never met Lague before, and I don't know whether the men were laying for him especially or not."

"Why didn't you lay an information with the Crown about the matter?" asked the reporter.

"Well, I have an aversion to getting into any mix-ups with the law," he replied. "I didn't know at that time that the investigation of the affair would cost me nothing."

Mr. Gove's statement, though it corrects a few of the minor details, does not help very much in the way of clearing the matter up.

#### Chinese Army Manoeuvres.

Chang Te Fu, Province of Honan, China, Oct. 23.—The autumn manoeuvres of the Chinese imperial army began yesterday in the neighborhood of Chang Te Fu. About 30,000 troops are engaged, under the command of Yuan Shikai, commander-in-chief of the Chinese forces, and including cavalry, infantry and artillery, the latter army consisting of 150 guns. The troops engaged in the operations are equipped with the most modern accoutrements, and have been drilled and trained by foreign officers. Thirty artillery attaches of foreign powers are closely following the operations.
