They are about as big as fair sized earthworms. Some snakes lay eggs, while others bring forth their young alive. In the latter category are vipers, rattlesnakes and nearly all water snakes. Python incubate their eggs after laying them.

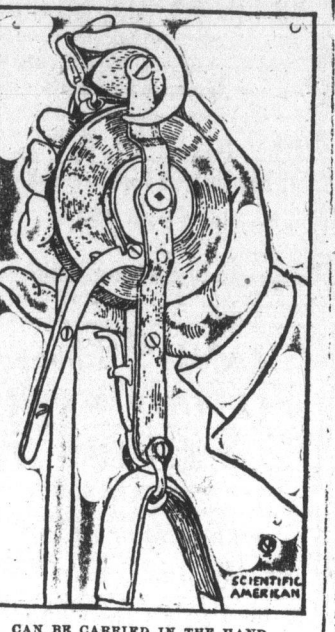

### PORTABLE FIRE ESCAPE.

Small But Efficient and Always Ready For Use—Can Be Carried in One Hand With Ease.

In the accompanying engraving is illustrated a small but very efficient fire escape which will be found useful in hotels or may be kept in the home ready for use in case of emergency. No hotel is perfectly fireproof, and a traveling man is constantly exposed to the danger of fire. For such person this fire escape is particularly advantageous because it occupies a minimum of space in the valise or trunk. It consists essentially of a roll of steel tape coiled on a drum and having

ing a grapple attachment to the free end, which may be hooked over the window sill. The drum is completely enclosed in a casing except for a pair of hubs which project on opposite sides and carry a pair of brake bands attached to a brake lever. The drum is mounted on a shaft which has bearings in a pair of side straps. The latter extend below the drum and form a handle by which the apparatus may be grasped. A shackle is attached to the lower end of the handle, and this carries a belt which may be passed around the body of the escaping person.

In use, with the grapple hooked over the window casing and the belt buckled around the body, the operator seizes both the handle and brake lever in his hand and lowers himself out of the window with an extra strap hooked at one end to the grapple. When ready this strap is released, and the tape is then let out under control of the brake bands—that is, the downward motion can be entirely arrested or varied in speed by varying the grip on the brake lever.—Scientific American.

### COMMANDS ROYAL YACHT.

Captain Colin Keppel, New Commander of Victoria and Albert.

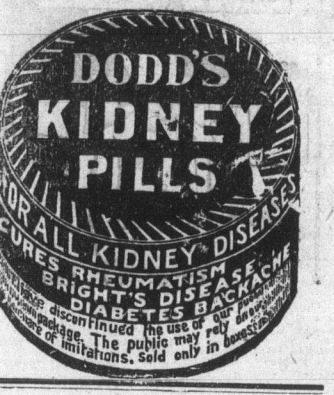
Captain Colin Keppel, C.B., D.S.O., the new Commander of the Royal yacht Victoria and Albert, is a seaman with a fine record. The only son of the late Sir Henry Keppel, he was born in 1862, and was educated on H.M.S. Britannia. He was Midshipman on the Inconstant during the Egyptian War of 1882, for which he holds the medal and the Khedive's star. As Sub-Lieutenant of the Invincible he did

good service with the Naval Brigade in the Nile Expedition of the Soudan, 1884-5, and became lieutenant in the late year. During the Boer War, he was in the Duke of Edinburgh's command in the Mediterranean, 1888-9, he was ensign and lieutenant, and in 1895 was made commander. Two years later he was sent to the Egyptian Government for service in the Nile, and commanded the gunboat Attila, being mentioned in despatches over the fall of Berber, and receiving the D.S.O. Khartoum gained him further mention and the C.B., and he received the thanks of both Houses of Parliament. He was promoted captain in 1899, and since 1901 has been in command of H.M.S. Grafton.

### The Earl of Darnley.

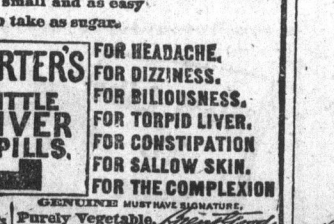
The Earl of Darnley, who took his seat in the House of Lords as one of the Irish representative Peers, says The London Star, restores the number of these noblemen from Ireland to the full total of 28 provided under the act of union, a number not reached, in a strict sense, until 1905, when the late Viscount Powerscourt, sitting as a representative Peer, was raised to the Barony of the United Kingdom. Though the Earl of Darnley enters the House of Lords in this manner, all his predecessors in the title since 1722 sat there in their own right as Barons Clifton of England. The Earl of Darnley is Baron Clifton in the Irish Peerage, but he is only heir to the Barony of Clifton in England, now held by his niece, the youthful daughter of his brother, to whose Irish Earldom he succeeded nearly five years ago. The English barony descends through the female line, when there is no direct male heir. The new representative Peer is a kinsman of the late Mr. Charles Stewart Parnell, having had a common ancestor in the father of Sir Henry Parnell, first Baron Conington, a distinguished member of the House of Commons in his time.

## SON FOLLOWS FATHER

KOSSUTH HOLDS FATHER'S PRINCIPLES—TRIES ANOTHER WAY.

As the Elder Kossuth Dealt With the Emperor Francis Joseph So Does the Younger, But the Latter Fights For the Independence of Hungary By Peaceful Means—Austro-Hungarian Relations.

A little more than a half century ago Louis Kossuth was one of the most prominent figures in the public eye as the foremost champion of the liberties of Hungarians. Now Hungary again is writhing in the throes of a movement for greater liberty or possible independence, and again a Kossuth is lined as leader. He is Francis Kossuth, son of the patriot who

pleaded the cause of his countrymen so eloquently some fifty years ago. Then as now it was the Emperor Francis Joseph with whom the advocates of Hungary's rights had to reckon. The elder Kossuth was Governor of Hungary during the brief period of its independence in 1849, but on the failure of the movement he fled for many years in exile.

Louis Kossuth died in 1894 in Italy. He had lived in that country during the later years of his life, although by the ancestry of 1867 he might have returned to his native land. Francis Kossuth was a civil engineer in Italy when the call came to him soon after his father's death to go to Hungary, take part in the Hungarian Parliament and lead the people which the elder Kossuth had once led. He responded to the call, gave up his Italian citizenship and on arrival in Bucharest was the recipient of many honors. In outlining the policy upon which he determined he said he would hold fast to his father's principles, but would seek another way toward their realization. He declared in favor of working for the economic independence of Hungary through peaceful means, expressed his admiration for the Emperor Francis Joseph and avowed his belief that the foundation for the latter's authority over Hungary would be more secure were the independence of that kingdom from Austria in all matters of administration recognized.

The relations existing between Austria and Hungary are peculiar. The two countries constitute a joint monarchy, and Francis Joseph I., who is now seventy-five years of age, is Emperor of Austria and apostolic king of Hungary. He became Emperor of Austria in 1848 and was crowned King of Hungary in 1867. The two states united under this dualism have separate constitutions and Parliaments, and each has for most branches of state affairs its own ministry and administration, but they are closely bound together by the identity of the ruler and by a prominent constitutional principle of union which, upon the common principle of possession and defense, was first proclaimed by the pragmatic sanction of 1723 and has since been regulated by the so called "compromise" of 1867.

In accordance with the constitutional union, foreign affairs and the greater part of war affairs and finances relating to them are dealt with by com-

mon Ministries. The control of these Ministries and the voting of the common budget are exercised by the delegations chosen from the Parliaments of the two countries. The proportion of expenses to be borne by each state is fixed by agreements. For some time there has been discontent in Hungary because of a belief that the rights of that state under the agreements forming the basis of union between it and Austria were being infringed upon. The Hungarian parties which have formed a coalition under the leadership of Kossuth demand reform of the electoral law and future universal suffrage, separation of Austrian and Hungarian customs and introduction of the Hungarian language and flag in the army, as contemplated in the "compromise" of 1867. It is reported that the Emperor has agreed to reforms in the electoral law, in the direction of universal suffrage, in other respects sufficient to stay the impending storm remains to be seen.

### A FUNNY LITTLE CRAB.

How the "Fiddler" Folds Up For His Long Winter Sleep.

One of the most interesting members of the crab family is the queer and grotesque little "fiddler," which lives in burrows in the banks of creeks and estuaries back of the beach. Into these burrows the crab retires in autumn and composes itself for a long winter sleep. The eye stalks are then folded down into sockets beneath the shell, and the large claw rests closed and inert against the body, while the legs are snugly closed upon itself, and it remains in this dormant condition until the spring. Early in April the "fiddlers" awaken and immediately attend to clearing out their burrows. The large claw is useless for eating, only the small one being available for this purpose. It is amusing to see the delicacy with which this little crab feels about and picks up the particles of vegetable matter and places them in the mouth, while the eyes are all the time raised aloft on their stalks and apparently looking off into the distance. The female crabs have both claws small and of equal size, so they are both used in feeding, and she can satisfy her hunger just twice as easily and quickly as the male. These "fiddler" crabs also gather food and store it in the burrows for future use.

### CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables Steady—American Markets Are Generally Easier.

London, Nov. 6.—Cattle are quoted at 11/6 to 11/6 per lb.; refrigerator beef, 8/3c and 8/4c per lb.

### TORONTO JUNCTION LIVE STOCK.

Monday was a comparatively quiet day on the Union Stock Market, but following fact was not a regrettable one. Two causes culled one to handle yesterday's trade, a unfavorable weather, and the other and chief one the unfinished nature of the stock on the market, consisting of 902 cattle, 12 calves and 3 horses.

Fair to medium butchers brought from \$3.50 to \$3.75, but not many at the latter end of the range. Rough and inferior sold at from \$2.75 to \$3.25 and butcher cows at \$2 to \$3.25 per cwt.

In feeders and stockers the run was a light one, and the quality was like the other grades, not good enough for the demand. A fair basis of value for the day would probably be as follows: For choice stockers, \$3.40 to \$3.75; common, \$2.40 to \$3.40; and butts, \$2.50 to \$2.75.

The market altogether for the feeder and stocker trade was fairly good and more good stock would have found a ready market.

There were few milch cows offered for sale and these went out for prices, ranging from \$3 to \$5.00.

In sheep, export ewes are quoted at \$4 to \$4.15 and bucks at from \$3 to \$3.50 and lambs from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per cwt.

Hogs are quoted at \$5.00 for select, and \$5.30 for lights and fats.

### MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Liverpool and London came weak on Canadian cattle and prices show a further decline of 1/2c, with sales in the former market at 10c. Ranch cattle sold at 7 1/2c to 8 1/2c, and sheep steady at 12c. This weakness is due to heavy supplies, some cattle being pressed upon the market, compared with the liberal shipments from here. Precedent and exporters are losing lowest on money. Shipments last week were 2222 head, 250 calves, 2000 sheep and 1000 calves. The weather and the consequent heavy but prices show little change. The demand for good cattle sold at 4c to 4 1/2c; fair, at 3 1/2c to 4c; common, at 2 1/2c to 3c; and inferior at 1 1/2c to 2 1/2c per lb. Fat stock, at 3 1/2c to 4c per lb. and sold at 3 1/2c to 4c per lb. and young veals at 2c to 3c per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at 6c to 6 1/2c per lb.

### Smallest State Eldest Out.

An agreement has been reached between Belgian and Prussian Governments for the cession of Belgium of the neutral territory of Moresnet, to Altenburg, in exchange for a strip of land adjoining the town of Eupen, in Prussia, eleven miles from Aix-la-Chapelle and close to the Belgian frontier. Thus the smallest European State has been blotted out. The existence of Moresnet as an independent State dates from the treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. Later it was under the joint protectorate of Prussia and Belgium. The latter country now takes over the entire sovereignty of the territory. Moresnet is divided between the Belgian Province of Liege and the Prussian Rhine province southwest of Aix-la-Chapelle. It is divided into Prussian Moresnet, Belgian Moresnet and Neutral Moresnet. The neutral territory, just ceded to Belgium, is about seventy acres in extent and contains the valuable Calamine mine of Altenburg.

### A Find of Ancient Coins.

The archaeological excavations in the island of Delos have recently resulted in the discovery of three leaden vases containing Athenian coins. The largest vase held 249 coins of four drachmas each, made during the rule of the Archons. These coins are of an admirable state of preservation and seem never to have been in circulation. Another leaden jar contained 172 coins, dating from the same period, and in a third jar were found thirty-six coins, some in gold and some in silver. The jars were under the cellars of houses at a considerable depth below the surface. Numismatologists consider this to be the most important discovery of ancient coins ever made in Greece.—Argonaut.
