Our fishery officers have hitherto maintained that the sawdust was of no injury to the fish and therefore millmen were not troubled when they disobeyed the law which prohibited its

Upon representation and investigation the Government have seen fit to order that sawdust and mill debris shall no longer be cast into our rivers, at least so far as this Province is concerned, under a penalty of \$100.
