Board of Trade Meeting.

A meeting of the Board of Trade has been called for this evening at 8 o'clock, in Temperance Hall. A number of important matters are to come up for discussion and it is important that every member should be at the meeting. We trust that our citizens may see the importance of their being present, and not allow any other engagement to interfere with their attendance. There are also a large number of our citizens who have not yet associated themselves with the Board. If the organization is to be of the best service to the town it should number among its members every citizen who has the interest of the town and district at heart. We hope to see the membership largely augmented this evening, and that the meeting may be one of great profit.

Town Council Meeting.

An adjourned meeting of the Council convened on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor, Couns. Borden, Bowler, Harvey, and the Recorder present. Verbal reports were made by the various committees.

Coun. Harvey, as chairman of the Police committee, reported that the police service was not what it should be, and suggested that the matter be fully investigated.

The chairman of the committee appointed to consider the matter of the appointment of the superintendent of streets and water-works reported, recommending that tenders be asked for through the adv. columns of the ACADIAN of applicants for the position.

The committee appointed for the purpose of investigating the matter of the proposed street through lands of C. A. Patriquin, O. D. Harris and others, reported, giving particulars of the same.

The matter of the police department was taken and considerable time was spent in discussing it, when it was decided that it be referred back to the committee for a further report.

The report of the committee on the proposed street was taken, up and the Mayor explained that the probable cost would be about \$500. The scheme was discussed at some length, and the advantages to accrue to the town by the opening of the street were brought out by different speakers. The outcome of the discussion was the passing of a motion that the Mayor and Couns. Borden and Harvey be a committee to meet with Messrs Patriquin and Harris with a view to coming to some agreement as to the expenses of the proposed street, and report to the Council as soon as possible.

It was resolved that the report of the committee on the appointment of superintendent of streets and water-works be adopted and acted on.

The Mayor reported that he had received notice from the clerk of the municipality stating that our proportion of the county taxes this year would be \$1228, against \$1058 last year, also that while the assessment of the town of Kentville and Wolfville had been increased considerably this year, the assessment of the municipality had been lowered.

On motion the date of the public meeting to be held was adjourned from the 14th to the 21st inst, and it was ordered that the ratifiers be notified so that they might be qualified to vote at the meeting.

Council adjourned to meet on Tuesday, 15th, at 8:30.

Sad Death.

The community generally was saddened on Tuesday morning to learn of the death of Mrs Harold Lawrence. Although the doctors entertained very little hope for her recovery last week, it was hoped by her many friends that she might yet be restored to health. During her residence in Wolfville Mrs Lawrence endeared herself to many with whom she came in contact, and her sad death is the flash of youth, has caused sincere and deep sorrow to many hearts. The greatest sympathy is felt for the bereaved husband, who has been called upon to smile such a loss. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon and was very largely attended. The service was taken part in by Rev. J. H. Macdonald and Hale, and was a most impressive one. The floral offerings were abundant and very pretty. The interment was made at Hantsport.

Among the floral offerings was a very pretty wreath, which with the following address was presented by the members of Court Blomidon, I. O. F.:

DEAR BRO. LAWRENCE,—In the days of sorrow and anxiety through which you have been passing, caused by sickness and death in your home, we your brother Foresters, have been deeply concerned. Our hope and prayer have been that recovery and consolation might visit you and abide, but He whose ways are not ours has added another bitter drop to your cup, and bid you drink it. We feel deeply for you in your sad bereavement. As a brotherhood in which your name is honoured and your worth is prized, we beg to offer you our unfeigned expression of sympathy. Words fail to convey our feelings of sorrow for you at this trying hour. We trust that the Head of our Fraternity, the Supreme Ruler of the universe, "Who doeth all things well," having in His infinite wisdom, summoned your spirit from the cares and anxieties of this life will bid you to humbly bow in submission, and give you grace to say, "Thy will be done." A CORRESPONDENT REFERS TO SEVERAL MATTERS OF INTEREST TO "ACADIAN" READERS.

MR. EDITOR,—Saturday's mail would be incomplete without the ACADIAN, whose welcome appearance at the post office on that day may be looked for with regularity. The happenings incident to the life and business of your growing town, as reported from week to week, are eagerly anticipated and absorbed, by many who although not resident there, are nevertheless warmly interested in whatever concerns its progress and prosperity. One thing at least is clearly characteristic of the life and genius of your corporation, namely, its ability to conduct its business economically and well. Wolfville's corporate existence has thus far proved itself a success, and has in many ways tended to improve and expand the nature of things embraced within its jurisdiction.

Notably in the past few years has Wolfville become known as a home place of culture and refinement, surrounded with an atmosphere of moral and intellectual attractiveness appearing almost beyond resistance to those living outside the charmed circle of its beneficent influences. We have read with pleasure the account in your paper of the address and presentation of the Baptist church and congregation to your esteemed townsman Mr George V. Rand. Many who remember Mr Rand in the Auld Lang Syne, will most heartily endorse all the good things expressed and intoned in the address presented to him.

We hope to see the new hotel in due course erected at Wolfville, and the reputation of the town as a summer resort practically demonstrated to tourists. We shall also wait hopefully to see Main street where it bounds "Mad Creek" straightened out; the public library and reading room established and the several other very necessary improvements suggested in the last issue of your paper, taken in hand by your ever alert Board of Trade and Town Councilors. If such were done much would thereby be accomplished towards beautifying and enhancing the value of property in the town.

Friends of the "Forward Movement" in connection with Acadia, living "without the camp," are waiting to see what Wolfville is going to do in the matter. Thus far, if I am rightly informed, the matter of soliciting aid has been principally at points quite outside the locus of the University. It would seem appropriate, under all the circumstances, if this educational project could have had its beginning at Wolfville, and been started with a good round sum, by those who are privileged to dwell under the shadow and benediction of "those Institutions on the Hill." Hants Co. Baptist Convention.

The Baptist Convention of Hants Co. convened at Annapolis, Tuesday and Wednesday last week. A considerable number of delegates were in attendance, and notwithstanding the storm of the second day the meetings were well attended and full of interest. The Convention opened with a prayer-meeting Tuesday morning from 11 o'clock to 12, led by Charles Palfrey, at which a deep earnestness prevailed. At 2 o'clock the session of B. Y. P. U. was opened with a devotional service led by Rev. J. Murray. Verbal reports of the various societies followed. The interest in young people's work in the county seems to be deepening. Rev. Robert Murch, of Rawdon, gave a very excellent address on "The Young People's Work." Pastor Huntley followed with an earnest address, after which quite a number engaged in free discussion of "The Elements of Success in B. Y. P. U." In the evening the W. M. A. S. P. U. took charge, Mrs Nalder presiding. Communications were read from Missionary John Hardy. Stirring addresses were heard from J. Nalder, Lic., Pastor Huntley and Mr Glendinning of the Volunteer Band of Acadia.

Wednesday morning Deacon S. H. Mitchiner opened the S. S. session at 10 o'clock with a season of earnest prayer. Miss Ida Lockhart read a paper on "The Great Need of our Sunday Schools." The considerable discussion followed. The following which interests the Aux. Board were considered. Rev. A. A. Shaw read a paper on "The Worship of Saints and Relics." It was a most interesting and valuable subject and verbal reports from the churches were generally encouraging. The closing session of the Convention began at 7 o'clock, when after the usual vote of thanks, a large number of interesting questions was answered by Rev. Mr Hatch, late of Newton Theological Seminary, who has recently been supplying the pulpit of the Wolfville church. The exercises were thoroughly enjoyed by all present. Rev. S. H. Baker then preached the Convention Sermon on "The Christian's Standing." It was an eloquent and powerful discourse and much enjoyed by the assembly. Pastor Huntley led a brief evangelistic service after which the Convention adjourned to meet in Rawdon the latter part of May next. The hospitality of the friends at Annapolis was very cordial and the presence of a number of friends outside the Convention, notably from the College and Wolfville, assisted in making the meetings a grand success.

Children's Carnival.

The Children's Carnival in Aberdeen took on Friday evening last was fairly well attended both by the young people in costume and the older ones as spectators. Quite a number were present from Kentville, Canning and other places. The costumes exhibited considerable originality and some of them were very pretty.
