

Items Of Local Interest

Mr. A. M. Young is making changes in his building which will give him considerable additional room.

At the annual convention of the G. W. V. A. held last week at Port Arthur, Ont., Halifax was selected as the next meeting place.

Several members of the College Faculty met at the home of President G. B. Cutten Friday evening, where they held a surprise party.

Mr. Ralph Fuller, who has recently been ill at Ottawa, has sufficiently recovered to again take up his duties in departmental work.

The pretty little cottage on Gaspareau Avenue which has been under construction during the past summer by Mr. John Miner is approaching completion. It will be occupied during the coming winter by Dr. Zwicker and family who are closing their residence at Port Williams and coming to Wolfville to reside.

Mr. Justice Drysdale, one of the ablest of Nova Scotian Supreme Court Judges, has resigned, owing to ill health. He represented Hants County in the Provincial Legislature from 1891 to 1905 and was the Attorney General of the province from 1905 to 1907, when he resigned to accept a seat on the Supreme Court Bench.

Chiefs of the "Big Five" Railway Labor Unions of the United States which called a strike for October 30, last night appointed a committee to draw up a resolution calling off the proposed walk-out and present it as quickly as possible at a meeting of the Labor leaders, who temporarily adjourned their session, begun this morning, pending action by the committee. Indications were that it would be some time before the resolutions could be drafted.

What might have been a serious accident occurred Saturday morning, when an auto truck carrying 15 students of the Acadia Geological class was upset down a steep embankment near Blue Beach. The occupants were thrown clear of the car, and escaped without injury. As the car was approaching the Beach, owing to a sharp curve in the narrow road, it ran too near the edge of a steep bank. The only damage to the car was a broken windshield.

According to statistics just compiled by the Department of Agriculture, Fruit Commissioner's Branch, it will require approximately 5,850 cars to protect this season's apple movement from Nova Scotia. Export shipments to the United Kingdom and early shipment to Canadian and American markets will be taken care of in box or lined cars but nearly 2,000 refrigerator cars, will be required for the late shipments. Up to the present approximately 300,000 barrels have been marketed, a record movement for a corresponding period.

A late Regina paper gives particulars of a fatal airplane accident which occurred at that place on October 10, when Lieut. Lloyd Rees, stunt flyer, while attempting to transfer, by means of a rope ladder, from one plane to another, in mid air, fell 500 ft. to his death. Particular interest to Wolfville people attaches to the affair from the fact that the pilot of the plane to which he was transferring was Lieut. P. M. Wallace, son of Mr. and Mrs. Burpee Wallace, of Yorkton, formerly of this place. It will be remembered that Mr. Wallace had experience at the front with the Royal Air Force, and was brought down behind the German lines and spent three months as a prisoner of war. The accident was due not to any negligence of either of the pilots, but rather to the recklessness of the stunter.

Mr. Bigelow thinks the "Bluenose" has capabilities not yet brought out though he was much pleased with the race. This reminds us, in recalling the ship building industry of our country that Mr. Bigelow's father the late John Bigelow, Jr. and Thos. E. Bigelow built vessels at Medford as late as 1874 the Bk. Medford being the last product. In thinking of Kingsport we always should remember the late Eben Cox, who built so many vessels for J. E. Woodworth, P. R. Creighton and C. R. Burgess; his last effort being on the largest ships of this County. Nor should we forget Vaughan & Loomer, who built large vessels at Mill Creek in the 70's and 80's. J. E. Steele and Jacob Lockhart who built at Scotts Bay, Joseph and James Jackson, who built the "Rambler" and others at Shettletting, A. B. Baster and John and Wm. Irvin, who built at Baxter's Harbour, John Neville, who built at Halls Harbour, and J. B. North and Sons, of our eastern border, who would be second only to E. Bigelow & Sons in Tonnage built.
