Ottawa, Jan. 19-(Canadian Press) The annual convention of the Great War Veterans' Association is to be held in Montreal on March 22nd, ac cording to an announcement from the Dominion Executive of the Great War Veterans' Association. The Dominion command has been diligently organizing in an effort to secure further consideration of their claims from the

Government The date set for the annual convention is much earlier in the year than has been customary, and this is attributed to the fact that Parliament will be in session at the time. A series of Provincial conventions will precede the Montreal gathering, in order to secure a democratic expression of opinion from returned men on the question of more adequate re-establishment and the much mooted topic of political

Special significance is attached to his event by veterans, it is said, because of the present political situation and the dissatisfaction existing in respect of recent parliamentary action.
