Breakdown of Transportation and Military Operations Makes it Obviously Impossible

London, Nov. 27. - Hope that Europe may obtain any cereals or flax from Soviet Russia is entirely unfounded, says a circular from the Russian Liberation Committee in London, an anti-Bolshevist organiza-

The circular recalls that according to the Food Commissariat's plans, roughly 7,250,000 tons of breadstuffs were to be delivered to the Soviet Government by December 1 but, owing to the breakdown of transporta tion, the Siberian quota of 2,000,000 tous can only be brought in with the greatest difficulty, while the Caucaactivities was a discussion led by tons cannot be relied upon owing to sian estimated output of 1.750,600

Quoting the Bolshevist Investia for the statement that up to October 1 had been delivered, the circular points out that it will be obviously impossible to bring in the deficit by December 1.

As regards flax, the circular again quotes Bolshevist figures showing that the area sown in 1920 had shrunk to one-fifth of the pre-war area. The present crop was estimated at a mere 55,000 tons, from which, the circular deduces, little or nothing will be available for export.

### PRESIDENT U. F. A SAYS FARMERS SHOULD ORGANIZE

They Would Get Together and Hold Wheat, Price Would Be Restored

Calgary, Nov. 27.—There is no question but that every bushel of wheat in the world is going to be needed and the demand justifies a higher price than it is now selling at," was the comment of H. W. Wood, President of the United Farmers of Alber ta, when shown a dispatch containing only 100,000 tons of various cereals the statement that if every farmer in the wheat belt of North Dakota would hold his wheat 20 day, that the price would go to nearly \$3 a bushel.

"The present comparatively low level of wheat," continued Mr. Wood, "is the result of organization, cohesion and system among the principal buying agencies. If the farmers of the selling countries could get as efficient organization they could restore the higher level of prices just as rapidly as they have been reduced. The question is, can the farmers do this in time to save the situation?"

Mr. Wood remarked that, what he called, the indifference of the Gov-ernment to farmers in the selling of this year's crop of wheat was creating a sentiment among the farmers everywhere that they would have to in defense of their own interests, and out of that was growing a remark able development of a sentiment for
