PROPOSAL IS ALSO TO ESTABLISH SYSTEM FOR ADJUSTING LABORERS WAGES

London, Oct. 1.-A letter which Mr. Lloyd George has caused to be sent to a correspondent announces that the Chancellor of the Exchequer will inaugurate his land campaign at a meeting to be held at Bedford on October 11. The Central News Agency circulates what it claims to be a forecast of the findings of the land committee whose report is now in the hands of the printer.
