TOWN COUNCIL HELD MEETING

Meeting To Discuss Water Question Largely Attended—Citizens Take Part In Discussion

A meeting of the Hartland Town Council was held on the Council Chamber Monday evening. Mayor Boyer in the chair. Attendees: H. R. A. W. B. Nixon, C. W. McQuarrie, A. Y. Dickson, H. H. Hatfield, and Warren White answering the role.

Mayor Boyer called the gathering to order and stated the object of the meeting. Clerk read notification of meeting.

Ald. Dickinson read a communication from the Public Utilities Board advising the council that the Board meets on March 25 to consider rates, etc. Pointed out that old agreement was only effective to December 31, 1924, and that in all probability, the rates of electric current, as affecting town of Hartland would be taken up.

Ald. McQuarrie and Ald. Dickinson spoke on the advisability of sending a man to St. John to meet with the board and look after the interests of the ratepayers. Ald. White also spoke on the question and stated that he had certain information that he would be glad to place at the disposal of the delegate.

Moved by Ald. H. R. Nixon that a delegate be sent to St. John to attend meeting of Public Utilities Board. Carried. Ald. Warren White appointed. Mayor then informed the Council that Rev. Mr. Lester had made an investigation of the pumping apparatus and the council agreed that he should be heard. Mr. Lester's preliminary remarks made plain to the audience that he had never been in a position like the present one and before he was through he would likely decide that he would never undertake a similar mission.

In another column will be found the report of his test.

Mr. Lester also spoke as to the condition of affairs at the reservoir which he found to be in a sad state of disrepair.

Conditions about the springs which augment the town water supply were very bad. The surroundings are not such that after inspection one would relish our town water. Mr. Lester was of opinion that it would not cost a fortune to fix up the springs so that we could have a gravity supply of water that would partially take the town out of the pumping.

As to the condition of the reservoir he found a bad leak in one end and the building, particularly the roof was in a bad state of disrepair. From his remarks and figures one would believe that without the item of labor being taken into consideration the pumping of water by crude oil was the cheaper of the two methods. The most interesting and perhaps the most astonishing statement made by Mr. Lester was in regard to the gravity supply. He felt certain that if the springs that flow into the reservoir were cleaned up and repaired in the right manner, the town would have a gravity supply that would save the ratepayers considerable money.

Discussion at this point became general. Mr. Faulkner spoke of leaks in the reservoir. Mr. Murdoch said that two years ago during a test the level of the water fell 1 1/2 inches in five hours or 12 inches in 24 hours. Moved by Ald. White that the report of Mr. Lester be accepted and placed on file. Carried.

Messrs. Ed. MacCollum, Amasa Plummer, M. L. Hayward and others entered the discussion and Ald. W. B. Nixon also submitted figures. R. Hagerman in the course of his remarks, submitted figures as to the relative costs of both systems of pumping, using either the crude oil engine or the electric motor as a standby.

Moved by Ald. White, that council extend to Rev. Mr. Lester a hearty vote of thanks for his trouble in making the numerous tests and investigations.

Mr. Lester fittingly replied after which the council adjourned.

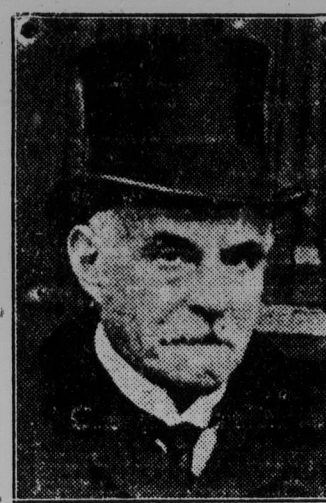
HARTLAND BAPTIST CHURCH

OFFICIAL REPORT TO TOWN COUNCIL

Given at Meeting Held Monday—Was Cause of Considerable Discussion—Report Adopted.

The following is the official report of Rev. E. W. Lester, on the pumping situation in the town as given to the Town Council at the meeting on Monday night.

First Test Electric Motor
Measured water in the reservoir, 4 ft. in the South Side and 5 ft. in the North, metre reading 1222. Mr. Murdoch was three minutes starting motor and getting water pumping. At 12.22 noon, pump making 48% revolutions per minute. Stopped motor 2.20 p. m. water measuring 4 ft. in South side and 5 ft. in North side. Metre reading 1224.

Second Test Crude Engine
Mr. Murdoch was ten minutes fixing torch, 15 minutes starting motor and getting water pumping. 34 minutes from time of lighting torch before he left the pumping station. Started pumping 4.13 p. m. 2 ft. 9 in. of water in the South Side of the Reservoir when commenced to pump. 5.25 p. m. Mr. Murdoch was 10 minutes working on engine, oiling, etc., stopping engine at 6.02 p. m. water in reservoir measuring 6 ft. 9 in. in South Side of reservoir. Used two gallons and seven pints of kerosene oil for fuel for the engine. 5/8 of a quart of motor oil. 1/4 of a quart of lubricating oil. 1 pint of gasoline for torch, pump making 45 revolutions per minute, or on a two-hour test, the electric motor pumped 3 ft. 6 in. in the South Side and 1 ft. making 4 ft. 6 in. on one side of the reservoir using 2 units electrical energy and with the crude engine pumped 4 feet of water in the south side of the reservoir, using 2 and 7/8 gallons of kerosene. 7/8 of a quart of motor oil and 1 1/4 of a quart lubricating oil, and 1 pint of gasoline.
