BASEBALL

Coun. John N. Perry Dead

At the home of his sister, Mrs. F. W. Burns, Fort Fairfield, on Friday, the death occurred of John N. Perry, only son of the late Rev. John Perry, the well-known F. C. B. preacher.

Mr. Perry was many months ago seized with a severe illness and went to the home of his sister, who is a trained nurse, in the hope that the physicians in the Woodstock town coupled with her care could do something toward the restoration of his health. In spite of their best endeavor he grew worse until the end.

Mr. Perry, as did his father before him, was held in high honor and esteem by the whole county. For many years he sat at the County Council board and he served patiently and intelligently. His remains were brought to his home at Connel and the funeral was held from his home on Sunday and was very largely attended. The preacher was the Rev. F. E. Bishop, Baptist, of which church the deceased had been an active member. Rev. M. H. Manuel assisted in the service.

Those left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father are his invalid wife, and a daughter, Amy, and two sons, Fred and Bert. Fred recently returned from overseas service.

Mrs. G. Murray McLeod

The community was saddened on Tuesday to learn of the death of Mrs. G. Murray McLeod, after two weeks illness of pneumonia. She is survived by her sorrowing husband and her two little children. Before her marriage her name was Miss Ruth Belyea and was a popular and much beloved school teacher, a daughter of the late Frank Belyea, who died there years ago yesterday. Besides her husband and two children she is survived by several sisters, among whom are Mrs. H. A. Sippelle, Misses Ethel, Elta and Margaret and Mrs. Albert Smith of Alliance, Alberta, and Jennie at home. There are also brothers Owen and Glenn.

The mother is now the wife of Charles Ebbett of Simonds.

The funeral services were held yesterday afternoon, at Waterville Baptist church, conducted by Rev. E. A. Trites and C. N. Barton.

Mr. and Mrs. McLeod came here to live only a few months ago, the former being the efficient manager of the Farmer's store. His own health is somewhat impaired, he having suffered severely from influenza. Deep sympathy is felt for the young man in the untimely loss of his wife.

The Late William S. Henderson

On April 3, the home of Thomas Travers (St. Thomas) William S. Henderson departed this life after an illness of a number of weeks at the age of 74 years. His nephew, Armond Henderson was with him the last two weeks he lived, and all that kind hearts and willing hands could do was done for his comfort. Much credit is due Mr. and Mrs. Travers and the people of St. Thomas for their kindness and constant vigil through the old gentleman's sickness; and a number of them followed him to his last resting place, despite the terrible condition of the roads.

Mr. Henderson professed faith in Christ quite early in life and was a member of the Baptist body; and left the witness that he had gone to be with Christ which is far better.

His remains were taken to the home of Henry Smith (Windsor), Mrs. Smith being a niece of Mr. Henderson.

The funeral was held on Saturday, April 5, 10 a.m. at the Windsor church. The Windsor choir was in attendance and rendered some beautiful selections in their usual efficient manner.

Interment in the Avery Cemetery (Knowlesville) beside his wife who was formerly Miss Augusta Avery preceeding him 22 years ago. He is survived by one brother, Albert, of St. John, and three sisters, Mrs. Annie J. Mann of California, Mrs. A. D. Gault of Fairville, and Mrs. W. A. Tedford of Windsor. The two last named were at the funeral.
