Want Government To Supply Cattle Feed

Petition of Westmorland County Farmers Being Largely Signed

A petition addressed to the Provincial Government of the Province of New Brunswick is being widely circulated and signed throughout the Parishes of Westmorland County and others of the province.

The petition concerns the farmers of the different counties and pays the local government to do something towards securing a supply of cotton seed, oil cake and other live stock feeds from outside points selling the same to the farmers at a reasonable price. The petition states that the price of the above feeds has become prohibitive and thus the raising of live stock has been made almost impossible. The action of the Ontario Government in regard to a similar problem is cited in that province the sum of one million dollars was set aside for the purpose of procuring a supply of seeds from the United States. The supply was put in the hands of one particular firm to sell to the farmers at a reasonable price. Similar action on the part of the New Brunswick is being asked by the hundreds of petitioners who have already signed the memorial.

Mr. Jacob Hans, a prosperous farmer at the Gorge was the one responsible for the getting up of the petition and the idea has gained much favor among the farmers of the various parishes. The petition is still in circulation and is being widely signed.—Times

Col. MacKenzie D. S. O. Meets Hero's Death

Fell on August 28th. Leading His Men To Victory

That the Fighting Commander of the 26th New Brunswick own battalion, had met a soldier's death on the field of honor was the sad intelligence received here on Thursday by Mrs. Charlotte McKenzie wife of Lieut. Col. A. E. G. MacKenzie, D. S. O. whose death in action is mourned all over the Province of New Brunswick, for there is hardly a home within its borders, who have not had or have now some friend or relative within the ranks of that regiment, and helped to bring glory to our Province through their many victories under the gallant leadership of Col. MacKenzie.

The official telegram bore the sad message that he had been killed in action on August 28th when according to despatches the Canadian, swept the enemy from Jigsaw Wood. In grand style and also cleared the enemy from the trench systems in Bony-Notre Dame and Pelves, and it was on these operations, no doubt, that Lieut. Col. MacKenzie gave up his life.

Lieut. Colonel MacKenzie, who was thirty-eight years of age was a native of Campbellton. After completing his school education, he graduated from the University of New Brunswick, receiving the degree of M. A. from that institution. He engaged in the teaching profession for several years, and was for some time Principal of Harkins Academy and it was while here he met and married Miss Charlotte Troy, daughter of Postmaster J. M. Troy. Later he studied at the St. John Law School and received the degree of B. C. L. from King's University, later being admitted to the New Brunswick bar.

Removing to Campbellton, he entered upon the practice of law there, at first in partnership with the late Judge Trueman. He was prominent in politics, taking a fitting part in the councils of the Liberal party on the North Shore and in 1912 he was an unsuccessful candidate for the local legislature. He was a prominent in the Masonic fraternity also, and was an active member of the Caledonian Society.

When he first joined the 26th battalion, November, 1914, nearly four years ago, he was a captain in the active militia. He was given the rank of major and was placed as second in command under Lieut. Colonel McAvity. He served throughout the first strenuous winter with distinction and succeeded actively to the command in April, 1916, having his appointment confirmed in September of the same year. For some time he had served as acting "brigadier-general" and with the advantage of a recent "refresher" course, it is believed that he was in line for further higher honors had he lived to attain them. His Distinguished Service Order decoration was awarded in January, 1917, for consistent good work in the handling of the third battle of Ypres, Courcellette, Vimy Ridge and Passchendaele, and more recently it seems at Amiens and in the heroic struggle on the Scarpe in which he met his death, the Canadian achievement in these two battles having been declared to be without parallel in the history of the war.

Besides his widow the late Lt. Col. MacKenzie leaves, his parents Mr. and Mrs. Archibald MacKenzie, of Campbellton, four brothers, three of whom are on active service and three sisters.

Newcastle Girl Admitted to N. S. Bar

Miss Frances Fish First Woman Lawyer in Nova Scotia Bar

Tomorrow will be a red letter day for the feminist movement in Eastern Canada for the first woman lawyer will be admitted to the Bar. The name of this modern Portia is Miss Lillian Frances Fish and she hails from Newcastle N. B. Her first collegiate studies were undertaken at the University of New Brunswick where she obtained the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Thence she went to the University of Chicago, securing an M. A. Three years ago she enrolled at the Dalhousie Law School, graduating last spring with a splendid record behind her. This summer she has been associated with the firm of Maclean, Paton, Birchell and Ralston. Although Miss Fish is the first woman to be admitted to the local bar, she is not the first to actively embrace the profession of law.

What the Knights of Columbus Mean by "Everything Free" at Army Huts

What we mean by "Everything Free" in our buildings, in the camps is that we do not operate any canteens in any of our buildings, either in this country or in France. Anything we have for the soldiers of great or small value, is given without charge with the single exception of postage stamps.

In this country, in most of the camps we have boxes filled with tobacco and a supply of cigarette papers so that the soldiers "may roll their own," and there are occasional distributions of cigarettes, coffee sandwiches, etc. but these latter are as a rule only distributed in connection with some entertainment held once or twice a week.

Abroad, similar occasional distributions are made in the training camps and at the ports of entry. The only place where we attempt, or intend to attempt, to make any greater distribution is right behind the lines to the men coming out of the trenches, or in the hospitals or convalescent camps. We have purchased for such distribution abroad a large quantity of cigarettes, cigars, sweet chocolate, drinking chocolate, coffee, condensed milk, soup and bouillon cubes, shaving gum, hard candy and we are operating what are known as "Automobile soup kitchens" these last, of course, to be used just behind the lines.

We hope you get the point in the foregoing that our aim is the free distribution of what we have to supply is to provide mainly for the men right at the front, not so much for the men back at the base who have access to the Army Canteens and quartermasters' stores.
