SOMETHING VERY MUCH LIKE IT.

This condition of things is by no means confined to the United States, but extends to Canada as well. As to whether it reaches Manitoba and the northwest we are without advices; but from Ontario to the Atlantic coast it is the rule. The "blight," as it is called for want of a better name, is a disease which appears in the principal leaves of the plant. These dry and turn brownish at the tip, and the change gradually extends up until it reaches the stalk. The whole leaf assuming a reddish color and apparently becoming absolutely useless to the plant. The stalk itself does not die, but goes on heading out. The question is whether there will be
