

which is the earliest the Orloff and Poland give evidence of being the earliest and the most prolific. The amount of seed to the acre ranges all the way from 1 1/2 bushels to 2 bushels to the acre. It is thought that best results are obtainable from the 2 1/2 bushels to the acre.

Peas are also the subject of investigation. Several varieties are growing quickly and every plot but one has been inoculated. This is an advance as no inoculation was attempted on the pea plots last year. Attention is given in another quarter to different grasses, and with winter rye. One plot of the latter has reached a height of five feet. Twenty-eight varieties of potatoes have been grown with a view of experimenting as to distance apart and depth of seeding.

In another section of the farm are some of the hardy apple trees. Thirty varieties of hardy apple trees are doing well for their first year and some of them appear to be well adapted to stand the climate. Of the ornamental trees the best success is obtained with the product of the farm's own nursery. The trees are all always of questionable variety. This year Mr. Hutton is in a position to distribute seedlings of Caragana, Manitoba Maple and other trees. These make very desirable ornamentation to the farm.

The First Object Lesson. "I would like every farmer to know the advantages of the value of alfalfa," said Mr. Hutton to a Bulletin representative. "The land should be sown over with the packer after breaking and summer fallow and very often alfalfa seeding. This makes an ideal seed bed as it renders the soil more capable of retaining moisture. The reason for the winter killing in fall wheat this spring has been due more to lack of moisture than anything else. The advantage of the value of packing is that it has produced an increase of 27 per cent in the production of a field of oats."

There is also the alfalfa question, said Mr. Hutton. "If we can get farmers growing alfalfa properly the fodder question will be forever solved. On July 13, 1939, a plot of alfalfa which was inoculated yielded 4150 tons of dry hay and a field of the same size not inoculated yielded 3949 tons. Alfalfa is estimated to have 2 per cent more protein than timothy and five tons of alfalfa are said to be equal in nutritive value to 20 tons of timothy hay and to 4 1/2 to 5 of grain."

The speeches of the day, which were delivered from an improvised platform built by the exhibitors, were cringing to the province by the establishment of the experimental farm. Emphasis was placed on the necessity of growing early maturing grains and of cultivating the soil so as to retain all the moisture possible. As the first annual excursion to the Leacock experimental farm, the day was a great success in every way. All who were present expressed in some way or other their appreciation of what is being done at the farm of agriculture and returns home to do missionary work for the farm. The next excursion is scheduled for next year the attendance will be greatly increased.

ST. PAUL REGATTA CLOSING EVENTS
Winnipeg Eight Trained in Two Lengths Behind the Winner But Her Crews Took Other Events

St. Paul, Minn., July 18.—Winnipeg took three events out of the four, the senior bantam, senior singles, and junior fours, in the latter half of the international regatta. NEW ACT NEXT SESSION.
Minister of Public Works Informs Good Roads Convention of Important Change in Law.
Hon. W. H. Cushing, minister of public works, attended the good roads convention which was held at Winnipeg last week. He stated that the government intended to pass a rural municipalities act during the next session which would give the formation of rural municipalities with power to borrow money and spend it as they see fit upon roads and other local improvements.

Disapproves of Act.
"The government recognizes," said Mr. Cushing, "the need for local improvement act has outlived its usefulness and that it will be of little avail to attempt to patch it up. A new act will give rural municipalities the same powers as are at present possessed by towns. Government money will in future be confined principally to expenditure in new districts and settlers in older localities will be expected to attend largely to their own needs. The government expenditures in older districts will in future be curtailed."

"Specifications have been prepared by my department," said Mr. Cushing, "but they have not been lived up to. As to the expenditure of government money in future, I can not say whether it will be handed over to the local authorities, as recommended by the convention, or whether it will be disbursed by the government itself."

Local Member's View.
Mr. Tolford, M.P. for Lac du Bonnet, declared that the building of good roads was too heavy a burden for the rural municipalities to undertake. He thought that narrow tires were the great enemy of good roads and favored the appointment of road inspectors who reside in the various districts of the statute labor system.

Resolutions Passed.
The convention passed the following resolutions after considerable discussion:
1. Resolved that this convention is of opinion that good roads are accompanied by systematic drainage as the greatest need of the farmers of the country and that the government should better the conditions of those who are engaged in farming and tend to a more general settlement and cultivation of the rich farm lands of the country.

2. Resolved that in the opinion of this convention the expenditure of public money upon roads, bridges and

drains should be managed upon business principles and entirely removed from party politics.
3. Resolved that this convention is of opinion that such government works should be constructed by the system of tender and contract, and that no government money should be expended on public works except under said system.

4. Resolved that the government be requested to publish statements showing the amounts of public money allotted to and expended in each constituency since the formation of the province.

5. This convention is of opinion that the foregoing provisions for the construction and improvement of roads, bridges and drains should be a part of the statute law of the province.

6. Resolved that a copy of the resolutions passed at this convention be forwarded to the government of the province.

7. That the government of Alberta at next session of parliament give consideration to the following: (1) To all local governing bodies to borrow money for the purpose of constructing and maintaining roads, such money to be expended in accordance with the sole control of said local governing body and that the government guarantee the municipal debt of such bodies; (2) To the money which at present are expended by the government in road construction to be granted to local governing bodies the amount of each individual grant being based on the current taxation of said local governing body.

Local Association Formed.
A good roads association was formed in the constituency of St. Paul and two representatives and the council from each township and the good roads committee of the Board of Trade. CORRESPONDENCE.
THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE
Editor Bulletin:
Sir,—The excellent statement of the board principles upon which a faculty of agriculture should be included in a modern university is given in your editorial column of July 17. It causes me to feel that any special contribution I can make regarding the experience of a single state is of little value. However, I have created evidence sometimes appeals more effectively than the generalizations based upon it, perhaps your readers will be interested in the account of my recent interview with D. E. W. Hilgard, Emeritus Professor of Agriculture in the University of California and expert in the field of Agriculture. Professor Hilgard has spent practically all of his life in the service of agriculture and is generally looked upon as the leading authority on most topics connected with that important industry.

Just a word here on Dr. Hilgard's main work as an agricultural expert. It has been in the line of soil analysis, a peculiarly technical science requiring the highest specialized training of the university man in order to secure accurate results. When Professor Hilgard began his work in California 20 years ago and talked of soil analysis, he was regarded in the farming districts as an aimable lunatic. Today, however, the laboratories of the university have added millions of dollars to the annual income of the state, his lunacy is considered to have been more practical than the sanity which condemned it.

Professor Hilgard informed me that the College of Agriculture has been operating as an integral part of the university for forty years, during thirty-five of which he had himself presided over the work of the college. He was surprised to know that it should have been stated "that the union was a failure and had had to be dissolved. It was true that occasional attempts at separation had been made, but they had always been connected with some practical "practical" politics and had never been endorsed by the sound thought of either the rural or urban population. The faculty of the College of Agriculture were dreamers, romancers, and not "practical" men; (2) that the students graduated from the College of Agriculture went into any profession rather than agriculture; (3) that the students of the College of Agriculture were looked down upon by the other students. With regard to (1) I have before me a letter from Prof. Alfred Atkinson of the agricultural college in the question of establishing the institutions of higher education is just now before the people of the province of Alberta. It is an important question and ought to be dealt with slowly, in order that no serious mistakes may be made.
