Last Night's Lecture at Canon Wood Hall.

The meeting for men in Canon Wood Hall last night, opened by the singing of a hymn, a short prayer by Rev. Mr. Moulton, and reading of the Scriptures by Rev. Dr. Jones, after which the Rector, in a few well chosen words, introduced the speaker for the occasion, Hon. R. A. Squires, who took as his subject "Efficiency." In addressing the gathering he pointed out the things most essential in our every day life, in trade or other occupations where efficiency is required. By concentrating our thoughts on the work we are about to accomplish, we stand a better chance of reaping the benefit of our labors. An efficient person is not always the one that works 12 hours out of 24, neither is the accumulation of great wealth any proof of efficiency. He laid special emphasis on the need of reform in our present educational system. The keynote of the address is given in a few words, "take advantage of your spare moments." The address was eloquent, instructive and interesting and greatly enjoyed by all present. The Rector, on behalf of the men, complimented the speaker on the able manner in which he handled so difficult a subject, and in referring to the address illustrated his remarks by referring to great men of to-day, who are leaders in church and state. After the singing of a hymn the Rector pronounced the closing prayers.

Mr. Allen's Concert.

The annual concert by Mr. A. H. Allen took place in the Methodist College Hall last night. The number present was small but appreciative, and those who failed to attend missed a rare musical treat. The singing of the choir was all that could be desired. The solos by Messrs. Snow, Newman, W. S. Cornick and F. Seymour were beautifully rendered.
