Bulgaria and Turkey, to deal with the armistice as purely a military issue, between the military commanders. Should this procedure be followed, it is regarded here as probable that several days may elapse while the German General staff, nominally at least subordinate to the Civil Government, can consider the conditions laid down and reach a decision. There can be no argument as to the terms, no matter how harsh they may appear to the Germans. The only course left to Germany is to accept or reject them. Meantime Marshal Foch is expected to continue the pressure on the Teutonic armies which now threatens their safety along a 200 mile front. No announcement has yet been made when the terms of the armistice will be made public. Their publication very probably will be delayed until Ger many has reached a decision with regard to their acceptance or rejection.

> ACROSS AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN LINE AMSTERDAM, Nov. 6.
