Jack Kearney, manager of Dempsey, at a dinner to newspaper men recently, said:

"Dempsey will fight Wills within twelve minutes, twelve hours, one week, one month or a year, and that goes unconditionally, and we will fight not for a purse, but for charity, if necessary. We are not afraid of Wills, never have been and never will be. Jack Dempsey, who is now working for Universal, will meet any man in the world—white, black, red or green."

Tex Rickard, when asked for his views on the subject, said:

"I am ready and willing to match Wills and Dempsey, and I hope no other promoters will interfere with the match, as they have done in the past."

Kearney got up again and said:

"The only reason Dempsey and Wills have not been matched is politics."

**The Haik Tug of War Cup**

Field-Marshal Earl Haig has presented the G.W.V.A. with a magnificent cup which it has been decided to award for the Tug of War Championship of Newfoundland, to be competed for annually at the G.W.V.A. Sports. The trustees of the cup are:

Lieut.-Col. T. Naagie, C.F.  
Lieut.-Col. C. Macpherson, C.M.G.  
Major L. C. Outerbridge, D.S.O.  
who have laid down the following conditions for competitors:

**CONDITIONS.**  
1. The cup shall be known as the "Haik Tug of War Cup".  
2. It shall be competed for yearly at the G.W.V.A. Sports.  
3. And shall be awarded to the Championship Amateur Tug of War team of Newfoundland.

4. The winning team or some person or persons on their behalf shall give bonds to the value of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00), which shall be returned when the cup is placed in the hands of the trustees one fortnight before the annual competition.

5. Any team of eleven men representing any organization, firm, place, district, etc., is eligible to compete.  
6. All entries must be accompanied by an entrance fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) which shall be refunded on the full team making its appearance when called upon to do so at the preliminaries.

7. The trustees shall have final decision in all disputes.  
8. Rules of competition are those laid down by the A.A.A. of Great Britain, which are as follows:

**TUG OF WAR RULES.**  
A. Teams shall consist of eleven competitors each.  
B. A centre rope shall be affixed to the centre of the rope, and six feet on the side of the centre rope a side rope shall be affixed to the rope. A centre line shall be marked on the ground, and six feet on each side of the centre line a side line parallel thereto. At the start the rope shall be taut, and the centre rope shall be over the centre line, and the competitors shall be outside the side lines.

C. No knots or loops may be made in the rope. The crossing of the rope over itself constitutes a loop. The rope may be gripped by the end man of a team, under the arm and passed over one shoulder. It may be looked

at, but not touched, by any other member of the team.  
D. No competitor may wilfully touch the ground with any part of his body other than his feet. Touching the ground with the hand, wrist or persistent slipping down or sitting is not permitted.

**POWERS OF THE JUDGE.**  
E. In all Tug of War Competitions, there shall be one judge, who shall have sole control with power to appoint assistants. It is within the discretion of the Judge to disqualify a team for any offence against these rules, even though only one member may be concerned, and to award the pull to the opposing side, or disqualify the offending team from the competition. He may also disqualify a team which after being cautioned persists in lying on the rope without pulling.

F. A "pull" shall be won when one team shall have pulled the side rope of the opposing side over their own side line, or any portion of the foot of any team leaving the rope by either side shall have pulled the side rope of the opposing side over their own side the "pull" shall be declared as won and shall not constitute one of the requisite number of pulls. Turning on the rope is allowed. No competitor shall make any hole in the ground with his feet, or in any other way, before the start.

(G) All competitors shall wear boots or shoes, of which the sole, heel and sides of heel shall be perfectly flush and not faked in any way. (This is not to apply to competitors in any event confined to H.M. Services, in which service boots as actually issued may be worn.)  
(H) In competitions open to men no member of the team shall be under the age of 17 years.  
(I) It is allowable for the Captain of a team to accompany his team on the ground, and to act as their coach during the contest, providing the Captain himself be also an amateur.

An examination showed that the breaking of a suction pipe was responsible for the water getting in No. 4. The boiler room is still full of water, while tons of coal have been washed from its bunkers. Temporary repairs will be commenced as speedily as possible, but before doing so a cofferdam will be built, besides there is much riveting and boring to be done from the inside. The ship's stern is now resting in the mud, and with the aid to port the repairs can be carried on without very much difficulty.

**THE SITUATION.**  
Investment Securities In The Center of the Stage.

The insistent demand for investment securities is the distinguishing feature of the situation at the moment, and is of course the natural result of accumulating funds reflected in the lowering interest rates. One cannot but be impressed with the sagacity of those financial interests charged with the responsibility of selecting the right time to finance the requirements of the American Telephone Co. The offering of \$150,000,000 stock could not have been better timed.

The stage would seem to be set for a broad bond market. Our absorption power seems almost limitless and with the outlook favoring "cheap money" for some months and with increasing pressure to put idle funds at work, the sellers of sound investment securities are surely in a favored position.

Some very impressive advances have already been registered by the more popular bond issues, mostly railroads, and others are sure to trail along, and what more natural than that investment stocks should also catch the step?

All of this helps to create a more cheerful frame of mind in financial circles, an atmosphere certain to make itself felt in industry before very long.

The steady upward climb of the rails—they are selling at a new high average for this year—is believed to forecast in part at least, constructive consolidation plans in the making and perhaps awaiting just the kind of a money market we are now enjoying.

It would be folly to assume that all our troubles have been suddenly swallowed up but a good-sized portion of our problem, whatever it may be, can be tackled courageously if a background of confidence can be created. That is just what our present investment market is now doing.

If we can "keep cool with Coolidge" and can emulate some of the virtues of our great leader now being extolled at the Cleveland convention, the year 1924 may not be as calamitous as at one time, the faint-hearted led us to believe it would be.
