

OUTSIDE SPORTS.

BASE BALL. PROFESSIONAL GAMES. The fourth game of the championship series between the ATLANTICS and RESOLVES was played on the Brooklyn grounds on Thursday.

HOW TO PREVENT SUNSTROKE.—A medical work says:—"In the first place we may premise that a man whose pores are open and who perspires copiously while at work, stands less danger than one who feels his whole system depressed from the inability to do so. This last class should avoid drinking too much cold water, but instead simply take a handkerchief, dip it in cold water, and wring it out. This placed in the crown of the hat, and its moisture renewed from time to time, will be found an effectual protection. A green leaf or sponge will answer equally well, and would keep moist longer. The temptation to drink large quantities of ice water while exposed to the sun's rays should be resisted; a cupful now and then is sufficient, one half of which might with benefit be used to wash the hands and face. Wipe the pores of the skin kept open, and these directions generally followed, cases of sunstroke would be almost unknown. Men of temperate habits have, however, but little to fear from the sun; those whose constitutions are weakened from the habitual use of ardent spirits generally being its victims."
