Montreal, Sept. 24 Sir Thomas Shanga essy returned from his annual inspection trip to the West today. "Everybody in the West appears satisfied," said the Canadian Pacific railroad president, "and there is no reason they should not be for the farmers of the West are the richest agricultural people in the world. The grain crop will be a bountiful one, but the wet weather is retarding the harvest and delaying the movement of the crop and will mean a very short shipping season. We made ample preparations for the harvest before it was ready and under the existing conditions we can only do the best we can. 
