A PROTEST.
Peterboro, Nov. 17.—Today Mr. G. Sherry, barrister, Northwood, on behalf of Mr. J. A. Sexsmith, Conservative candidate for East Peterboro in the late election, served Mr. B. Morrow, returning officer, with a protest against the return of Mr. John Lang as member for East Peterboro, on the ground that Mr. Lang had made the required deposit by check instead of bank bills or specie, as required by law.

SERIOUS ILLNESS OF JOSEPH RYMAL.
Many people will regret to learn that Mr. Joseph Rymal, ex-M.P., is very low in his home in Merton township. He has been in poor health for some time, but was able to go out to vote at the recent election. Since that he has been dangerously ill. Saturday was his birthday, he having been born on Nov. 17, 1821. Mr. Rymal belongs to the old school of Liberals, and he was for years a leader in Wentworth county. He was a member of parliament for many years.

Mr. Kidd, it is stated, will not resign his seat in the Dominion House in order to let the Hon. George E. Foster run in his constituency. Intimate friends of the newly-elected member for Carleton say positively that he will not entertain the idea for a moment, and support him in this stand.

The Liberals of Halifax will tender a banquet to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in that city early in December. Covers will be laid for about 500 guests, and the banquet will be one of the most elaborate ever held in Canada.

THE BOERS

REORGANIZING

Botha Said to Have Started a New Government.

Another Report States the Enemy's Guerrilla Operations Are Growing Less Formidable.

Pretoria, Nov. 18.—The Boers are active. It is alleged that Commandant Louis Botha has established a government at Roendal, north of Middelburg, and that with the £150,000, which he has available, he is paying the fighting burghers a crown per day.

Commandant Abel Erasmus is said to be at Oliphant's River, with 2,000 men, 1,000 wagons and 12,000 cattle. From Heidelberg it is reported that the Boers are compelling the burghers who had surrendered to take up arms again under pain of death.

A Cape Town dispatch states that on account of the present disturbed condition of affairs in the Orange River Colony and the Transvaal, Sir Gordon Spragg, premier of Cape Colony, will be unable to attend the opening exercises at the inauguration of the Commonwealth of Australia in January.

The premier deputized Hon. J. Frost, member of the cabinet without portfolio, to represent the Cape Government.

TREKKING CHECKED.
Pretoria, Nov. 16.—Two strong Boer commands, with herds of cattle, have arrived near Balmoral, one on each side of the Witte River. They have been trekking from the bushveld, where it is impossible for the cattle to live in the summer. The object of the move appears to be to reach good pasturage for the cattle. Gen. Delarey appears to be trying to move south for the same purpose, but has been checked by Gen. Plumer, in the Magaliesberg passes, which are now firmly held by the British.

LESS FORMIDABLE.
The guerilla warfare in South Africa has become less formidable. The centers of hostile operations in Dutch territory may have multiplied, but the Boer commands are thinning out from death, illness and desertions. The skirmishes recorded daily by Lord Roberts are petty affairs. In which scores of Boer combatants are engaged, where formerly there were hundreds, and sometimes thousands. Consequently casualties are light and few prisoners are taken.

WEARING THEM OUT.
The British army is adapting itself to the altered conditions. It is gradually wearing out the energies of the persistent and obstinate foe. Where once there were divisions with a complete staff organization, there are now brigades and lightly equipped mobile columns are sent in pursuit of small bands of guerillas.

Gen. Kelly-Kenny, who commanded the sixth division in the terrible march across the veldt, has been relieved from command at Bloemfontein, and Gen. Hunter has taken his place.

Either Lord Roberts or Lord Kitchener is picking out men who have real capacity for fighting the Boers. The scattered bands of Boers are constantly harried and

ALLOWED NO REST.
The lines of communication are strongly guarded, and are not seriously menaced. The Boers are alert, but only because they are constantly taken from them, and here and there small groups are killed, captured or taken prisoners. They have not had a single success in the last six weeks, and the sum of their losses is considerable.

ADDITIONAL CASUALTIES.
London, Nov. 19.—An additional official list of wounded South African soldiers, issued Saturday evening, includes the names of the following Canadian lieutenants: J. H. Elmslev, E. W. Turner and H. G. S. Cockburn.

CANADIANS COMING HOME.
Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The department of militia has been notified by cable that Hiam, Jones, Cunningham, Large, Jones and Bouchard, invalided soldiers, sailed on the Cornithian on the 14th inst. for Canada.

Kinston, Nov. 19.—Lieut.-Col. Hudson, C Battery, 22nd Hunt, Strathcona Horse, died of Bright's disease, Pretoria, Nov. 14. Referring to his telegram of yesterday, 105, Builder, since Lieut. Hunt is from Millerville, W. De Vere Hunt is from Millerville, Alberta, and went out with the reinforcements for the Strathcona Horse, Serkt. Builder belonged to the 35th Battalion, and was reported on Friday seriously wounded. He has since died.

THE BEGINNING OF

NEGOTIATIONS

For Settling the Chinese Trouble Seems Near.

Field Marshal Waldersee Insists on Withdrawal of Chinese Troops From the Allies' Territory.

London, Nov. 17.—A dispatch, dated Pekin, Nov. 17, via Shanghai, Nov. 18, says: The belief that the note of the powers to the Chinese commissioners, Prince Chin and Li Hung Chang, will be completed soon is strengthened by the result of the recent informal conferences of the ministers of the powers. United States Minister Conger said to a correspondent today: "The situation is apparently very favorable to the early beginning of negotiations for a preliminary settlement. I believe that the next meeting of the envoys will virtually settle all points of difference between the representatives of the powers. Military operations are virtually at a standstill. The German and Italian expeditions northward passed through Nan Kau unopposed."

CHINESE TROOPS MUST WITHDRAW.
Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee received Prince Chin and Li Hung Chang, the Chinese peace commissioners, at Pekin on Thursday in the Imperial palace. The field marshal demanded that the Chinese troops be withdrawn from the vicinity of the territory occupied by the allied forces, adding that if this should be done the dispatch of military expeditions by the allies would be discontinued.

PUNITIVE EXPEDITIONS.
Opinion is strong, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, wiring yesterday, that the European commissioners are doing more harm than good by the punitive expeditions, which, by the destruction of the villages, excite the Chinese to execute the foreigners, a feeling which it will take a century to eradicate.

VICE-ADMIRAL SEYMOUR, on board the Eridanus battleship, Centurion, and Herr Knapp, the German consul-general here, on board the Fuerst Bismarck, having ascended the river with the object of stopping remittances to the court, and securing the payment of customs funds into the banks.

A ROBBER REPUBLIC.
St. Petersburg, Nov. 19.—The Russian troops are encountering a robber republic in the mountainous basin of the Upper Sungari, in Manchuria. The president of this band of bandits is a certain Chai Sheng, Gen. Fung, a few days later, with a mixed Russian force, engaged 3,000 of Chai Sheng's followers in the same place in which Lieut.-Col. Duraffont fought the bandits, and captured two guns.

A BRITISH PROTEST.
London, Nov. 18.—Under date of Nov. 18, a dispatch to a news agency says: Great Britain has protested against the transfer of Yu Chang to the governorship of Wu Chan. Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching, according to this dispatch, have memorialized the throne, and Yu Chang will probably not be allowed to take up the new post.

EUROPEANS TOO EASY.
Shanghai, Thursday, Oct. 11.—From Pekin to Shanghai it is next to impossible to meet a European or American who has resided any length of time in China, but who believes the real trouble has not really commenced. They bitterly reproach the powers for not being more severe in their measures, particularly for not absolutely destroying the Forbidden City at Pekin. Old residents of Tien Tsin, Che Foo and Shanghai say it was a grave blunder that will in the near future cause the loss of thousands of lives through the destruction of much property. It is a well authenticated fact that hardly a Chinaman outside the Province of Chi Li believes that the allies have had any success at all.

EMPEROR DOWAGER LIVES IN HOPE.
Some English missionaries, who have been years in the country, and who are at present at Shanghai, say the empress dowager has a better knowledge of the Chinese situation, the character of the people, and their possibilities than any other human being alive; also that she has one or two very able advisers. These missionaries believe that the removal of the court means that she thinks that with time on her side she will come off victorious. They laugh at the so-called overtures of the throne, whom they assert has as little to say regarding affairs of state as any school boy.

BITS OF CHINA.
Chinese officials at Hong Kong aver that a certain power has demanded leave to place troops upon a hill overlooking Canton. No foreign authority confirms the assertion, but the Cantonese continue to fear French designs upon the city.

The viceroys of the Yang Tse region have stopped the shipments of the tribute of rice to Sian Fu, being afraid that the allies would intercept them. The court, it is evident, will proceed to Chen Tu.

There is considerable commotion here, says the Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Mail, in consequence of a report that Great Britain intends to send out a flying squadron.

A HUNDRED MORE VICTIMS.
Galveston, Nov. 19.—The United States surveying corps Saturday found over 100 dead bodies in a swamp west of the city on the island, where they had been deposited by the storm of Sept. 8. The unburied dead were in an out-of-the-way place near the country road, and had not been discovered by the burying parties sent out after the storm.
