THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Jan. 23—11 p.m.—The center
of the shallow depression has moved from
Lake Superior to the Georgian Bay, and a
deeper depression has moved from the
extreme Northwest Territories to Dakota,
followed by an area of high pressure which
has brought a decided fall of temperature
in Alberta. The weather to-day has been
milder in Ontario and the western portion
of the Maritime Provinces.Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Quebec, 40°—48°; Calgary, 28°—42°;
Baltimore, 38°—50°; Prince Albert, 2°—10°;
Qu'Appelle, 12°—22°; Winnipeg, 16° below
—6°; Toronto, 18°—28°; Montreal, 9° below
—12°; Quebec, 4° below—16°; Halifax, 2°—

Young Liberal Club spoke briefly as
visitors at the meeting of the Young Men's
Liberal Club in Toronto.—Miss Jessie Alexander's many friends
will regret to learn that her recovery will
be much slower than was at first anticipated
by her physicians and her engagements
have been cancelled for the next three
weeks.—A large icicle fell off the roof of the
Bank of Commerce this morning, struck a
lady in the head and knocked her down.
She was hurt, but managed to walk away.
The thaw is making this a source of danger
on the main streets.—The many friends of Mr. F. J. Reid,
contractor, East London, who has been ill
with the grippe, will be glad to hear that
he is recovering and expects to be at busi-
ness in a day or two. Mrs. Reid has suf-
fered from the same complaint and is yet
ill.—The return match between the Princess
Hockey Club and St. Thomas will be
played to-morrow night in the Queen's
avenue rink, and a full attendance is re-
quested by the local players, who are as
follows: Goal, Glover; point, Brown;
cover point, Van Hildan (captain); for-
wards, Lovey, Macbeth, Sippi and
Serenon. This will be one of the most
closely contested games of this season. It
starts at 8 o'clock sharp.—The officers of the Seventh Fusiliers
held their annual meeting last evening in
the drill shed. Lieut.-Col. Payne presided.
Reports from the finance, band and reg-
imental committees were read and adopted.
Committees for 1903 were elected as fol-
lows: Finance and regimental, Captains
Hayes, Moore and Kingsmill and Lieut.

Thomas professional, who won the first
heat, did not put in an appearance. Chas.
Griffith, Thomas James and E. Johnston
were the contestants and finished in the
order named, with Johnston a lap behind.
The others made a close finish. Griffith
wins first prize, James second and the third
will have to be raced for again.

George Grossmith.

The coming of Mr. George Grossmith is
an event which should be keenly appre-
ciated by citizens generally. The entertain-
ment provided is bright, clever and spark-
ling in the extreme, abounding in wit and
humor, yet free from the slightest vulgari-
ty or freedom of speech. Mr. Grossmith's
art is world-wide. As humorist and
musical entertainer he is simply unap-
proachable. From the moment he steps
completely in hand, and then keeps them
for two long, happy hours, which are alto-
gether too short, in convulsions of laughter,
or, as the New York press puts it, "on the
verge of epilepsy." He comes here on
Thursday and Friday next.Sutcliffe, a farmer, Westminster,

known to many in this city. He was a
son of the late John Milligan, and was 48
years of age. He was a widower and has
three sons, the youngest about 14 years
of age. James Milligan, of Delaware, and
John, of Westminster, are brothers of de-
ceased, and Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Beattie,
of Dawn, are his sisters.

'Husband and Wife.'

There was a capital performance at the
Opera House last night, the occasion being
the first performance here of Fendall &
Phillips' new comedy called "Husband and
Wife." While the work makes no great
claim to originality, it is very bright and
a good motive for creating merriment.
There was fun in abundance, yet it never
descended to the farcical buffoonery so com-
mon to the stage of late, for this company
will compare favorably with the best organ-
ized troupes leaving New York. Several of the
characters are but sketches, yet all were
capably represented last night. Alice
Vincent, who succeeds Mrs. Dion Bouci-
cault, is a delightful comedienne, an ex-
cellent singer and a beautiful woman. Her
costumes were greatly admired.
Miss Gertrude Whitley, who recently
crossed the ocean to appear in
this comedy, made an excellent im-
pression as Mrs. Greenhorne. She is an
actress of decided ability. Mrs. C. A.
Haslam, Misses V. Douglas and Miss
Martin could not be improved upon in their
roles. The male characters were equally
well acted. Mr. W. H. Fitzgerald played
Greenhorne with very good taste and
humorous effect, while Mr. C. H. Bigelow
invested the part of the sporting Mr.
Monty Smith with a quaint earnestness,
both in manner and expression. The police
magistrate, Sir George Muddle, was also
finely characterized by Mr. Hall. Mr.
Monteith figured advantageously as Stept.
Mr. McGregor, Mr. Campeau, Mr. Kraus-
hoff and Mr. Powers played their parts
with ability and judgment.

THE YEAR'S AFFAIRS.

Annual Meeting of the King Street Pres-
byterian Church—A Satisfactory
Record.The annual congregational meeting of the
King Street Presbyterian Church was held
the other evening, Rev. W. M. Roger pre-
siding. The attendance of members and
adherents was not large, but much interest
in the proceedings was manifested by those
present. The report from the session
showed a small increase in the membership
over last year.The financial report of the board of
managers and the reports from the various
societies connected with the church were
presented, and after slight discussion were
received and adopted.The following amounts were contributed
during the year:
General fund of the church, \$1,665 78
Congregational collections for mis-
sions, 32 06
Women's Foreign Mission Society, 22 50
Falmouth school, 74 88
Y. P. S. C. C., 11 18
Young ladies' Bible Society, 43 48
Ladies' Aid Society, 33 40

Total, \$1,354 18

There has been a slight increase in the
receipts over last year, and consequently
the mortgage and interest liability of the
church has been reduced by a small amount.
A vote of thanks was tendered to the
pastor, Rev. W. M. Roger, to which he
suitably replied. Mr. F. Mutch, Wm.
Black and Andrew Dick were elected on
the board of managers for the term of three
years, and Mr. W. M. Reid for the term of
two years, the latter to fill a vacancy
caused by the resignation of Mr. G. W.
Logan. After some other business the
meeting was brought to a close.

Business Men's Administration.

New York, Jan. 24.—A special to the
Tribune from Lake Wood says a declara-
tion has been made that the next Adminis-
tration will be one of business men.
The following is Mr. Cleveland's announcement
of his policy: "The next Administration
will be a business men's Administration.
By that I mean that business men are to
have the preference in the appointments.
Of course, the business men will be Demo-
crats, but in making business appointments
I shall consider the business records
of the applicants. That will have
greater weight with me than the in-
dorsement of political organizations. I
shall appoint successful business men as
heads of the departments, and I shall ex-
plicitly state the policy to be carried out in all de-
partments of the Government. This is a
time when business men are needed. The
questions before the American people are
questions that can best be solved by busi-
ness men. Changes in the tariff and
economy in the Government will be easily
accomplished if plain, practical, honest
business men are selected." It is said that
the mission to the Court of St. James will
be tendered to Mr. Bayard, and that he
will accept, preferring this place to one in
the Cabinet.
