A LOCAL BUDGET.

—The Tecumseh House was filled to its utmost capacity last night, and still turned away nearly one hundred people.

—Mrs. Harris, of Clarence street, died yesterday morning, aged 81 years. She came to the city about a year ago with her daughter, from Hagersville, where one son now resides.

The sum of \$56.25 was contributed in London in aid of the Co-operative Mission of Algoma and the Northwest, and is gratefully acknowledged by George W. Watson, secretary.

—Mr. William J. Stevenson, formerly teacher at the Grove, London township, has been appointed principal of the public school in the town of Minerva.

—Ald. Harmon, of Windsor, brother of Conductor Harmon, of the G. T. R., who was killed in the accident at Princeton yesterday morning, arrived in the city last night, and will go on to the scene of the wreck today.

—While Malcolm McArthur, J. P., of Lobo, was in London on Saturday last, his house was entered and given a general overhauling. The visitors helped themselves to eatables, overturned the bedroom drawers, and left doors and windows wide open. The squire does not know how much was taken.

—The late Mr. Wanless' funeral. The remains of the late Mr. William Wanless were interred yesterday at Woodland Cemetery, the funeral being largely attended. Impressive funeral services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Johnston. The deceased's sons acted as pall-bearers.

ST. THOMAS CITIZEN DEAD.

Mr. Jesse Broderick, an aged and much respected resident of St. Thomas, died Monday at the residence of his son, Mr. W. C. Broderick. He was born in England 50 years ago, and had lived in St. Thomas for quarter of a century. His wife died twenty years ago. Mr. Broderick had been ailing for a couple of weeks, but death was due to old age. He was a man greatly respected in the community, and well-known in the city. He was a member of what is called the New Church. The deceased leaves five children—H. G., drygoods merchant; David C., merchant tailor, St. Thomas; John, of this city; Theophilus L. and William.

IN SPITE OF THE BISHOP.

Two young people of Sandwich East township on Monday succeeded in getting married despite the opposition of Bishop McEvoy to their union. The parties are Frank Reaume and Miss Minnie St. Louis. The groom and the bride's father oppose the separate school which Bishop McEvoy founded at Tecumseh, and give it financial aid, choosing rather to remain supporters of the public schools. The bans for the young couple were read in the Tecumseh church for two Sundays, but when Reaume and his father-in-law-elect continued firmly opposed to separate schools, they were informed by Father Villeneuve, parish priest at Tecumseh, that he was prohibited by the bishop from performing the marriage ceremony. The couple were married in Detroit later on.

KILLED BY A FALL

Mrs. John Jones Fractures Her Skull by Falling Down Stairs and Dies Next Morning.

Mrs. John Jones, of York street, fell downstairs Monday night and fractured her skull. She died yesterday at Victoria Hospital.

She arose during the night, and was walking upstairs in the dark, when she fell to the floor.

Live Items Culled for Busy People's Information.

The barbers of Windsor will form a union.

At his picnic at Wallaceburg last week Rev. Father Brady, formerly of Windsor, raised \$1,277.

J. B. Laing, provincial municipal auditor of Toronto, will make a preliminary investigation of the books of the township clerk and treasurer of Sandwich East, to see whether an audit is necessary.

The Huron Medical Association at Clinton has elected officers as follows: President, Dr. J. M. Dunsmore, Stratford; vice-president, Dr. Burroughs, Seaforth; secretary, Dr. Shaw, Clinton.

Charles Garlick, of Dutton, was placed on trial on a charge of placing obstructions on the L. E. and D. R. track.

An adjournment was made for a week in an endeavor to secure a settlement.

A solicitor, acting for Almira Ross, has issued a writ against A. D. Uelin, hotel keeper, Dutton, claiming \$500. It is alleged that Uelin sold liquor to the plaintiff's husband while he was on the Indian list.

Mrs. Alex. Watson, of St. Thomas, was leading a horse with a long rope, when the animal ran away. She was dragged a considerable distance, having her left arm dislocated and badly strained. She was also bruised about the body.

When No. 32, Michigan Central express, was standing at the St. Thomas depot on Sunday morning waiting for the conductor to get his orders, Chief Train Dispatcher George Rabbitt, looking out of an upstairs window, saw a man lying on his back on the top of one of the cars.

Depot Master Allen was notified, and took the man to his office. He was a pretty tough-looking object, being covered with coal dust. He was allowed to clean himself up, and was then told to get out of town. He rode from Windsor.

Mrs. Harris, wife of Edward Harris, who is employed by Dunsore Ferguson, con. 12, Yarmouth, went to St. Thomas on Saturday, accompanied by her three children. About 10 o'clock the misadventure occurred, and a girl 9 years of age, Gertrude, was killed.

CENTURY FUND OF PRESBYTERY.

Report Upon Details of Its Condition.

Several Important Resolutions Passed Upon and Much Business Transacted at Yesterday's Meeting.

Clark gave in the report of the century fund, showing that of the amount subscribed for the common fund by the presbytery, \$28,732, there had been received by the general treasurer \$28,098.
