

ried:
1. The presbytery having heard the report of the convener of the century fund, expresses its gratification at the faithful response there has been throughout its bounds to the appeal of the church, and especially in the sub-scriptions given to the common fund, the Presbytery of London standing 5th on the list of 52 presbyteries in its subscription to the common fund, and 4th on the list when regard is had to the amount of money paid in to the church

treasurer for the common fund on June 25, 1901. 2. The Presbytery strongly urges all, sessions, managing boards and con-gregations within its jurisdiction to make an earnest effort so that the full amounts subscribed may be remitted to the treasurer of the church at as early a date as possible, not later that

the 15th of October.
3. It is also urged upon all local century fund committees to see to it that an accurate copy is made of all subscribers in the congregation, Sab-bath schools and young people's so-cieties, and that this be forwarded at as early a date as possible to Dr. R. Campbell, Perth, the general agent. 4. Inasmuch as it appears that at least \$60,000 additional to the amounts subscribed is needed in order that the \$600,000 aimed at for the Common Fund may be obtained, congregations are exhorted to make an addi-tional effort in order that the amount subscribed for the common fund in this presbytery, \$28,732, may be raised to at least \$30,000.

5. The presbytery is desirous that the suggestions of the General Assembly for the deepening of spiritual life and the development of aggressive work in connection with this century fund movement be properly carried out and broker properly carried out and broker property. out, and hereby appoints the first Sabbath of January as a special day of thanksgiving, on which, wherever practicable, the Lord's Supper shall be observed. And further, the pres-bytery instructs the committee on church life and work for the current year to take into consideration the recommendations of the General Assembly (minutes, page 59), and report at the November meeting as to the best methods of carrying these into effect. An additional resolution was moved instructing the committee to take into consideration the best methods of carrying out the spirit of resolution

The discussion on Dr. McCrae's motion was continued at length, a number of members taking part. When the question was put to the house, the motion was defeated.

Rev. Mr. Currie then submitted a motion to delete the words "who are eligible for election" from the following rule: That presbytery shall have power to elect any members "who are eligible for election" to any assembly, independent of the rule of rotation.

This was carried. The grants from the augmentation fund for the past six months were passed—\$29 to Aylmer and Springfield; Appin and North Ekfrid, \$37 50. This grant was refused by Mr. Henderson. Fingal, \$125; Hyde Park and Komoka, \$65; Port Stanley, \$100; Tempo and South Delaware, \$62 50. The presbytery decided to increase the application for South Delaware and Tempo R. Stuart were asked to forward a statement to the executive of the augmentation committee regarding the needs of that charge. It was decided to appoint Rev. D.

J. Ellison, Dunwich, as a representative of presbytery at the annual meeting of the W. F. M. S., in Glencoe, on Rev. Mr. Drummond was granted leave to moderate in a call to Aylmer

meeting.

Rev. Mr. McGillivray reported as to supply of Hyde Park in the early part of the year, that it was practically provided for. This was received. Mr. Kelso presented the following resolution in connection with the retire-ment of Rev. John Milloy: The presbytery, in accepting the resignation of the Rev. John Milloy, of Crinan and West Lorne, feel grateful to God for having spared him to labor for so many years within its bounds. Mr. Milloy has been a member of this court for 30 years, ever ready and willing to do the work assigned him, and by his courteous, unassuming bearing he endear ed himself to every member. During all these years he ministered to one congregation, taking the deepest interest in the welfare of his people. Painstaking in pulpit preparation, faithful in the discharge of duty, and devoted to his pastorate, he had the satisfaction of knowing that his services were duly appreciated by an attached flock, the utmost harmony and goodwill always prevailing between minister and people. His ministry was owned and blessed by God in the upbuilding of the church, in the conversion of sinners and edification of saints. When the in firmities of 80 years began to tell upon his strength he felt it to be his duty to tender his resignation, and retire from the active duties of the ministry. The presbytery, in saying fareweil to their esteemed brother, pray that the blessing of God may rest upon him, and that when his work on earth is done, an abundant entrance may be granted him into the presence of his Lord, where there is fullness of joy. This resolution was cordially agreed
