London, Aug. 2.—Before a meeting of the British Medical Association at Manchester yesterday, Surgeon-General Hamilton definitely charged that during the Boer war of 1881, General Sir Redvers H. Buller "used army medical wagons with the red cross thereon for taking ammunition to the front and armed the bearer companies, using them as escorts." The surgeongeneral declared his authority for the statement was the principal medical officer, to whom the orders were issued, and he added that the British could not complain of the Boers doing what General Buller did twenty years pre-

EX-PRESIDENT STEYN. London, Aug. 2.-Mr. Steyn was too ill to bear the journey to London, although a special saloon carriage had been attached to the regular boat train for him. His physician would not allow him to be interviewed by the press, but Mr. Steyn sent word that he wished to express his thanks for the courtesies extended to him by the British authorities since the surrender, and for the care given him during the voyage. The ex-president was moved on a stretcher to the Dutch steamer Batavier III., which was moored close to the Carisbrooke Castle. He will be landed in Holland and conveyed in an ambulance to the cottage
