IMMENSE AUDIENCE HEARS REV. CHARLES M. SHELDON

First Methodist Church Crowded to the Doors.

Famous Preacher-Author's Views for World's Betterment.

The interest felt in London in Rev. Charles M. Sheldon, his work and methods, was shown last night when the widely-known preacher-author visited London for the first time. He gave a lecture at the First Methodist Church, which was listened to by one of the largest audiences which has ever assembled in this city. The church is the most commodious structure in London, but big as it is, it was not big enough to accommodate the termendous crowd which sought ad-

mittance.
Mr. Sheldon deeply impressed his hearers. He gave them an idea of some of the things which he would have if the world is to be better. For instance he is a Christian Socialist in that he thinks that the great necessities of life, the coal, iron, oil, water supplies, transportation and such things should be the people's. He believes that it is right and Christian that the common physical necessities of life should be owned by the people and be within reach of all, so that all might live in physical comfort and physical happiness. This is one of his ideas regarding a better world. He He believes that denominationalism

has reached its limit in doing good. It would be better now, he contends, for the churches to get together on the fundamental basis of the love of God and fellowmen and fight the prevailing sin, not quarrel about creeds and dogmas.

Mr. Sheldon is also a great believer in working among the children and the young people, as the fate of the church of the future rests with these. Out in Kansas in his own church, he preaches only one sermon a day to the grown people. He tells them to stay at home in the evening enjoying pleasures of family life, reading God's word and studying the problems of humanity for themselves-while he lets the young people have the church in the evenings, and lets them conduct the service themselves.

Mr. Sheldon would improve the newspapers of the country and strengthen them so that they would stand up for righteousness. People should also act together politically, he said, and each should do his share towards doing away with the drink evil. Mr. Sheldon's opinion is that the

fundamental method of bettering the world is by raising the plane of the nation's home life, which is the root of the Christian life. He said that a good home meant a profoundly religious, strong, virile Christian life. Rev. Mr. Sheldon came here in the interests of the building fund of the Wellington Street Methodist Church. "There has been such a remarkable zeal on the part of one or two local officers of the crown against Gerald Sifton that I can easily understand his position to be perfectly safe in giving evidence against the prisoner. Besides that, the jury finding Ger-ald Siften not guilty has, in effect, also declared Herbert not guilty. The now against Herbert is that of perjury, and the crown could prove that only by calling Sifton, and then it would be oath against oath, in which case a conviction could not be obtained."

"Coulid Sifton be asked questions which incriminated himself?"
