ELDER CURRIE PREACHES

Detends Strongly the Doctrine of Election.

Two Types of Professing Christians Jew and Greek

Elder H. M. Currie, of Ohio, pastor of the Covenanted Baptists, preached in the Baptist Church, South London, last night. His text was from John. iii., 3. Commenting on the necessity of a new birth, he said that there was this similarity between the natural and spiritual existence, namely spiritual growth could no more proceed from the individual will than could organic development from the will of plant or animal. Spiritual birth and growth, like organic growth, was the free gift of God, and depended in no way upon the will or the good works of man. The speaker said that he had been bowed down with the lowness of his own life, but felt that he was not alone when he had read Paul's cry for deliverance from a similar condition. "You talk about a religion based on hope," said he, "but I would rather be two thousand years behind the times, in the company of such men as St. Paul, than be in the van of so-called religious progress. There was no better evidence that one had been born again than that he had acknowledged his sin. God had his own way of convincing people of sin by writing his laws on their hearts. I will put my laws on your hearts,' said God. It is the law that makes one know that he is a sinner." Outside of God's election, continued the speaker, there is no salvation. Hope based upon anything else than God's eternal purpose was a vain and false hope.

Elder Currie went on to deal with two types of Christians to be found in the world today. "We preach Christ and him crucified, to the Jews a stumblingblock, but to the Greeks foolishness.' Those who depended upon their good works for salvation were essentially Jews, and to them Christ was a stumbling-block. The ancient Greeks were lovers of wisdom, but it was worldly wisdom.
