A MONTREAL SUICIDE

Merchant, Whose Son's Firm Failed, Takes Carbolic Acid.

Montreal, Nov. 17 .- Hiram Ruttenberg, Jewish pawnbroker, committed suicide today by drinking carbolic acid. Last week his son's firm, A. M. Ruttenberg & Co., failed, and this worried Ruttenberg, senior, especially as he was responsible for about \$30,-000 of the firm's liabilities. Today in a fit of despondency he took his life. A. M. Ruttenberg & Co., fur dealers, assigned, with liabilities of about \$82,-000. The largest creditors are: The Eastern Townships Bank, \$30,000, indirectly secured; A. Vogel & Co., \$12,-000, and Ravillon Frers, \$10,000.


