PASTOR SAYS HE MET JAMES' SPIRIT

Rev. Dr. F. A. Wiggan, Brookline, Tells of Feeling "Presence."

Boston, Mass., Sept. 5.—Prof. William James, America's foremost psychologist, died a week ago last Friday, has accomplished his expressed desire to communicate from the beyond, according to the Rev. Dr. Frederic A. Wiggan, of Brookline, pastor of the Unity Church.

Prof. James died at Chocorua, N. H., Aug. 28, but Dr. Wiggan, who has been attending a convention of spiritualists at Madison, Me., did not learn the news until last Sunday. He immediately set himself to get into touch with the spirit of the psychologist, and says that after an hour's summoning of his control the spirit manifested itself.

"The spirit of Prof. William James has manifested itself to me just as he promised he would," said Dr. Wiggan. "Within a week or so I believe my control will be fully attuned to the wave length vibrations of Prof. James, Dr. James, and Dr. Richard Hodgson, who passed over in 1906."

"When I learned last Sunday that Prof. James had passed on I retired to my room and endeavored to summon my control. Ever since I have been on my vacation my control has been weakened or has disappeared altogether for days at a time. In my individual case, my control seems to take a vacation about the same time that I do.

"With my control weakened, I felt it would be difficult to attain full communications with the spirit of Prof. James, but you must know that a man of Prof. James' high intellectual type will emit from his spirit high vibrations. As we have estimated these vibrations to vary from 30 in a week spirit to 70 in the genius, and I know that Prof. James' vibrations must be at the latter rate. To receive these spirit vibrations the control must be strong.

"My control came to me one time, and I experienced a strong intimation of a presence in the room. My conscious mind could not translate from the spirit to the mind the identity of the presence. Yet I feel positive that the presence that remained there, and that I have felt every night since, is that of Prof. James.

"When I established communication with the spirit of Dr. Hodgson it began in the same way."

NOW BURN INCENSE TO LADY NICOTINE

Chinese Give Up Opium for Delights of the Fragrant and Milder Weed.

Shanghai, Sept. 5.—While opium smoking is being put down in most provinces with a stern and steady hand it is clear to the vigilant observer in Chinese treaty ports that equally obnoxious means are being found to wreck the oriental victims of the drug habit. Wherever there is an European settlement, at any rate, such drugs as morphia are increasing in sale and uneasy whisperings are going on among those who come in contact with sufferers from physical and mental ills.

For that reason, therefore, the activities of Anglo-American firms to introduce cigarettes to the Chinese market are welcomed. Japanese are also in the trade, but the most successful wares are locally made from Hunan tobacco, and today there are thousands of Chinese between Shanghai and Yunnan with the tell-tale stain of nicotine on their fingers. In the west, where the opium habit has clung most tenaciously to the people, the skilled drummers of the eastern tobacco firms have penetrated to persuade the natives to discard the dope fiend for the goddess of nicotine. And every week the sales from the Han-wei and Shanghai factories increase in volume.

Parts of Shenai and Hunan are still growing opium, but even there repressive measures are producing good results. In Yunnan and Szechwan the suppression has been more thorough and, in fact, wherever there is a really progressive viceroy, grain is taking the place of the condensed poppy. And in the wake of the suppression is advancing the conquering tobacco agent.

The supreme court of Pretoria, Transvaal, refused admission to a white woman to practice, but has now granted this privilege to a Kaffir man, which is unprecedented.

PALACE IS BUILT FOR AUTO OWNERS

London Club Will Have Home That Excels All Others in Great City.

London, Sept. 4.—Nowadays New York is not the only city where great new buildings are erected in speedy time.

The latest illustration of fast yet sumptuous construction is seen in the new club premises that will soon be ready for the Royal Automobile Club, on the site of the old war office. Five hundred workmen are engaged on rearing this place in the modern renaissance style for the 5,400 car-owning members of the Royal Automobile Club, the largest and richest club of the great Britain.

Town All of Itself. The term club house gives little idea of the marvelous scope of the new building. Rather it is a miniature town with its own equipment for most of life's interests under one roof. Joy riders receiving unpleasant communications from the police will have no need to rush down town to secure legal advice, for a lawyer will be on hand every day long, for the sole purpose of aiding members in their difficulties with the authorities. Also included in the premises will be accommodations equal to the finest hotel, a photographic studio, ladies' restaurant, business offices, telephone exchange, barber's shop, manicuring and chiropody, and a central station, a telegraph office, swimming bath, Turkish baths, racquet courts, rifle and revolver range, gymnasium and assembly hall.

The keynote is given to the structure by the splendid vestibule, with its Doric columns, which connects with a fine lounge and lecture hall. Great care and skill has been shown in the equipment of the building. By means of a circulatory system, any of the numerous apartments are easily accessible to the members. They can get from place to place without picking out devious ways.

The club dining room, 100 feet in length, and the smoking room are situated at the ends of the ground floor. By the central staircase the lower ground floor is reached where there is a gallery overlooking the swimming bath. Here also are the dining and service rooms, arranged on modern scientific lines.

Fine Terrace in the Rear. The chief features lack of the club are magnificent terraces on the ground and second floors with a south aspect over Carlton House Terrace, where in summer members can bask in the sunshine, plan new routes or recount adventures. On the first floor are billiard and card rooms, a library, touring department and committee rooms. The three upper floors are given over to bedrooms, offices for members and six more committee rooms. In all there are eight floors, five of which are above the street level. A small office for the production of the club journal is to be established on the second floor.

About \$1,250,000 will be spent on the club, first and last. Cultivated taste, aided by wealth, has laid Europe under contribution for furnishing the ladies' dining room and members' smoking room, where the walls are to be decorated with lovely old tapestries from ancient castles in France and Holland. Further, the fine old Georgian ceiling from the secretary of state's room in the old war office is to be adapted for use in the smoking room. By the end of the year, when the building is finished and the premises are open for use, the Royal Automobile Club will be one of the finest sights in the whole city of London.

MILLION POUNDS FOR ART TREASURES

This Is Record at Christie's Auction Rooms in 1910—Some Pictures That Bring Fortunes.

London, Sept. 6.—Over £1,300,000 has been spent on art treasures at Christie's rooms during the year 1910. The picture sales of the season compare favorably in interest with famous dispersals in the past, such as the great Gillott sales in 1872, when a sum of £164,501 was realized; the Dudley sale 1892, which yielded a turnover of over £90,000, and the Day, Cuthbertson, Gaskell and Suttler sales last year, which produced an aggregate of £309,520.

The principal sale of the year was that of the remaining portion of the Young collection, with its magnificent examples of masters of the Barbizon and Modern Dutch schools. In three days £154,069 was obtained, a result which has only been exceeded on one occasion.

13,000 Guineas for Pictures. The wonderful records achieved by Turner in 1908 and 1909 paled before the 13,000 guineas fetched by Corot's delightful "Birds-Nesters" in the Young sale. The remarkable prices obtained throughout the sale afford an encouraging commentary on the value of the George Salting bequest, which was bought chiefly from this collection. The rapid rise in favor of the painters of the Corot school in recent years has brought considerable profit to those whose earlier appreciation of their works led them to collect when prices were low.

In the Day sale last year the net profit amounted to about half the total sum realized, and the dispersals in 1910 have furnished numerous instances of profitable collecting. Only £460 was paid 30 years ago for the Corot which changed hands this season at 13,000 guineas, while Constable's "Stoke-by-Neyland," which realized 8,800 guineas, was bought in 1869 for 100 guineas.

Jacques' pastoral scenes were obtained for not very long ago for about 50 guineas each, whereas a small painting of a shepherd and flock by him fetched 900 guineas in the Young sale. Millet, whose little picture of a shepherdess, measuring only 8 1/2 inches by 6 1/2 inches, brought 1,050 guineas in the Young sale, was at one period of his life so poor that he could not afford to buy canvas.

Treasure in Porcelain. The second sale of importance during the year was that of the collection formed by the late Baron Schroeder,

which yielded £138,058. In this the chief treasures were the rare specimens of French decorative art—Sèvres porcelain, gorgeous snuff-boxes, and other ornate objects made in the luxurious days of Louis XV. and Louis XVI. No less than 3,000 guineas was paid for a set of three little Sevres vases which have cost little more than a quarter the sum in 1886, while a Louis XV. snuffbox, acquired for £1,000, was resold at £4,000.

In this sale also there was again brought under the hammer the famous sixteenth-century crystal bibberon which realized the record sum of 15,500 guineas after a sensational contest in 1905. As was expected, its value dropped on this occasion to £10,000. Among other high totals obtained were:

- Cooper collection £12,305
- Waller Collection 69,672
- Falcke collection 37,230
- Thornhill collection 24,413
- Armstrong collection 11,077

The results of the various picture sales indicate that the trend of art collecting remains the same as in the last few years. The limit of price in both directions has probably been reached in this country. It is doubtful whether the once overrated mid-Victorian productions will appreciate lower in value, while since 1902 no single picture has exceeded in price Hooper's "Lady Louisa Manners," which was sold for the record auction price of 14,950 guineas.

FROHMAN SAYS CHURCH IS WEAK

He Wants Theatres to Preach Sermons On Sundays.

New York, Sept. 6.—Charles Frohman, who has hitherto been notable among theatrical men as a stout opponent of Sunday theatres, has announced that he is planning a campaign to obtain a modification of the New York State law prohibiting dramatic productions on Sunday. He explains that his scheme is in no way out of harmony with his previous policy, but that in common with a number of other social workers, including Jane Addams, of Hull House, Chicago, he feels that the church is not succeeding in coping with moral and ethical problems. He asserts that people are, however, perfectly willing to be preached at, provided that they can at the same time be amused. Mr. Frohman proposes, therefore,

to ask for the passage of a law allowing the production of plays Sunday which have a sound moral lesson, and suggests that these plays be chosen in each community by an appointed committee of citizens who have been identified with humanitarian projects, and that the strictest civic supervision be exercised over the productions.

OLD STREET DOOMED

Location Famous in History and Literature To Be Remodeled.

London, Sept. 5.—Within a few days Toward street, Southwark, just south of the Thames, will be in the hands of the wreckers. For this thoroughfare, so associated with Charles Dickens and historic events, has been condemned as disgracefully insanitary.

Six hundred years ago and onward till the passing of the coaching days this thoroughfare was part of the route from the continent and English armies passed that way to or from the French wars. Canterbury Pilgrims of the olden time also used the road and the Kentish rebels under Jack Cade once made it resound beneath their tread.

At a later time the genius of Dickens attached charming associations to the district that was becoming more and more a dismal slum. For here "Little Dorrit" was born and hard by, at St. George's Church, she was married. The doleful Marshalsea Prison was close at hand and relics of it are still visible in the masonry.
