Music and Drama

A Marvellous Lad.
Pepto Ariola captivated the hearts of a large audience of local music lovers at the Auditorium Thursday night. The marvellous boy endeavored himself to all and his listeners all most went wild with delight. But there is something about the quiet bearing of the handsome, romantic-looking boy which forbids undue exuberance in the expression of appreciation of an enthusiastic audience.

Pepto plays with the technique and finish of the world's best masters as he regarded it as the most natural thing in the world. There is a distinctly sophisticated or worldly-wise air about the delicate features of the Spanish profile overhung with dark curls. In his appearance he is a charming boy, but in all his actions, in the heavy, romantic tread characteristic of his race with which he comes onto the stage, in his graceful bow, in the way he raises his hands over the keyboard and rises from the piano, he is the mature youth who has received the plaudits of royalty and the world's greatest celebrities, and yet has passed unopposed through all the inconceivably perfect measure and truly marvellous technique, the fingers of the youthful artist played over the keyboard and unfolded a flood of music incredibly beautiful.

As an interpreter of Liszt Ariola is not to be excelled. In the evening he played the "Hungarian Rhapsodie No. 6" and "La Bestraume." In the afternoon he played the "Grande Polonaise." More words cannot describe the wonderful melody produced. Schumann's "Warum" and "Vogel als Prophet" also pleased the audience greatly. Less cheiksky's "Octave Etude" was charmingly rendered. The selections from Chopin showed Pepto's versatile art again at its best. He could not resist the applause which greeted his rendering of the "Polonaise, A Flat Major, Op. 53," and his encore number was equally applauded.

Pepto played one of his own compositions, "Romance in F," a piece of exquisite beauty, which well embodies the artistic temperament and inherent romance of the gifted child. The other artists were London favorites and that London can claim for her very own, artists like Cyril Dwight-Edwards, Miss Louise Macdonald and Miss Florence Eggleston, advances greatly the musical credit of this city.

Mr. Dwight-Edwards, baritone, was in exceptionally good voice. In the afternoon, among other numbers, he took his audience by storm with Capella's "Lorraine, Lorraine, Lorraine." His rendering of this number was particularly excellent.
